A PORTLAND BOARD.

"There being but one issue to be settled in the county convention, to-wit, whether Gatch or Davey is the choice for the congressional nomination, I am in favor settling it in this way. Let Mr. Gatch's friends and my friends agree upon a man for chairman, also for secretary, and, when they are elected, let a ballot be taken as to the preference for congressman. If Mr. Gatch receives a majority vote, I shall ask that he be given the right to select the entire delegation of 22 men to go to Eugene and work for him, first, last and all the time. If I receive a majority vote I shall expect
