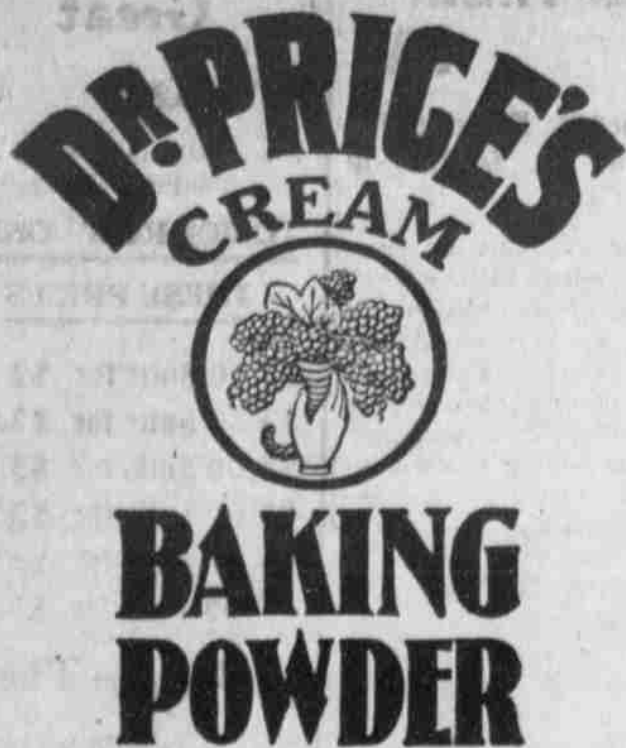


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RECRUITING OFFICE CLOSED

Nine Young Men of Salem to Enter Naval Service

Lieutenant Miller and Surgeon Dupree today closed the local naval recruiting station and departed on the afternoon train for Boise, Idaho, where they will enlist other recruits for the naval service. At this point 18 applicants presented themselves for examination, but of that number only nine passed the rigid physical test that is required, and were accepted. The nine young recruits will depart on the overland train tonight, in charge of an officer, for the government naval station at Mare Island, San Francisco, where they will go into training.

SEATTLE STRIKE STATUS

States mail cars from running. If it is necessary, we will furnish men to run these cars. There will be no violence if we can prevent it. We will have a number of committees made up of two and three men, stationed at the various points, to prevent any disorder or any interference with the property of the Seattle Electric company."

The Company's Statement.

"We shall be able to take care of this matter without a great deal of trouble, I think," said Jacob Furth, president of the Seattle Electric company. "I have no fears that the agitators will be able to control the majority of our men. The statements being circulated to the effect that the union has enrolled as many as 350 or 400 men are false. Not more than half the men have joined it."

"Our men have been well treated by the company, and they admit it. The relations between the officers and employees are of the most satisfactory character, and the policy of the company has been to do all in its power to advance the interests of the men. They say themselves that they have absolutely no complaint to make of the treatment they have received. This admission is useful, as it clears away any fog that might arise as to the grounds upon which the union is trying to create a strike."

"The only question between the company and its employees, is, therefore, the fact that some of our Seattle men have gone to Tacoma. This they did voluntarily. The majority of those that went there asked permission to go over, as they were new men working here as substitutes, and they thought they might find regular runs there. Any of our old men who went to Tacoma also went there of their own accord, and having done what they had a right to do they will be supported by the company."

Cannot Recognize Union.

"The aim of the union of course, is to force us to 'recognize' it, as the phrase commonly used by the agitators has it. This means that the officials of the company shall permit the men to run the road. As we are responsible to the stockholders for the care and operations of their property we shall of course decline to yield to the demand."

"We regret to have a strike, but under any circumstances we shall continue to operate the property in accordance with the wishes of its owners. I have no doubt we shall have the support of the public in taking our stand on this business proposition."

Upon his return to Tacoma last evening when Mr. Furth went yesterday afternoon to canvass the situation in that city, he added:

"The demands made by the committee were so unreasonable that no business man could accede to them. The public may judge of the facts when it is known that the first demand made is that we should bring back the men from Tacoma who went there of their own accord, the second that we should employ no one but a member of the union. It has been the policy of the company to employ men for their personal worth alone, never asking what affiliations they might have, with any union, church or political party. This rule will be strictly adhered to by the management in the future as it has been in the past."

The only disturbance of the day was Inspector Carson ordered J. W. Wagonblast, one of the strikers, out of the way at the corner of Fifth Avenue and Pike street, last evening about 7:30 o'clock.

Carson is a big man. Wagonblast being in the lightweight class. The latter said the street was a public place and he had a right there, but the inspector backed up his request with a vigorous shove. Some of the spectators say he struck the small man. Others say he simply pushed him out of the way. Wagonblast thinks he was hit a couple of times. He was going to have the inspector arrested.
