Restaurants all Closed on Account of Cooks Strike

Denver, April 1.-Seventy-four res taurants are closed today in conse quence of the cooks' and waiters' strike, and thousands of people are greatly inconvenienced. The grocers' butchers' and bakers' clerks threaten to strike in sympathy with the cooks and waiters, and let the entire city go hungry. Many restaurant keepers de clare they will never again unionize their places, and are endeavoring to secure non-union workers.
