PRISON CHANGES HANDS

Superintendent James in Full Charge

Makes but Few Changes and None Radical

C. W. James, of Baker City, formally took charge of the penitentiary this afternoon, succeeding J. D. Lee, the retiring superintendent. The taking of the inventory of the prison property was not completed until noon, and the transfer could not be made until then. The inventory was made by Earl Race, the retiring bookkeeper, and his successor, Thomas R. Wilson. "I will not make any radical changes in the subordinate positions at the prison for the present," said Mr. James this morning, when questioned with regard to further appointments. "I have now about as many new men as I care to take into training at one time," continued Superintendent James. "I will take my own time to name the other officers. In justice to the retiring officers it is to be said that their places have been filled because of the voluntary resignation of those officers. No removals have been made. New appointees will be announced as the present employes may be desired to be relieved of their positions."

Superintendent James yesterday posted in the prison office a notice requesting all employes of the institution, not otherwise notified to report for duty Wednesday morning. The same notice requested that officers desiring to be relieved of their positions, advise the superintendent at once. Thus far Superintendent James has made the following appointments: Warden—E. A. McPherson, Portland.

Deputy Warden—G. F. Johnson, Baker City.

Bookkeeper—Thomas R. Wilson, Portland.

Whole Village Massacred.

Sofa, April 1.—The Macedonian committee announces that a revolutionary band of 31 men and the inhabitants of the village of Abalicho, near Istib, have been massacred by Bazouks. The band, it is added, was surrounded in the village, artillery brought up, and, after 10 hours' fighting the village was completely razed and burned, and all the inhabitants, without distinction, massacred. The Turkish losses are reported to have been even greater than those of the other side.

DENVER GOING HURGRY

Restaurants all Closed on Account of Cooks Strike

Denver, April 1.—Seventy-four restaurants are closed today in consequence of the cooks' and waiters' strike, and thousands of people are greatly inconvenienced. The grocers' butchers' and bakers' clerks threaten to strike in sympathy with the cooks and waiters, and let the entire city go hungry. Many restaurant keepers declare they will never again unionize their places, and are endeavoring to secure non-union workers.

As a result of the cooks' and waiters' strike, the organization of a central labor body, to be known as the Denver Pure Food Trades Council, is proposed. With this organization will be affiliated the various unions of the cooks, butchers, bakers, grocery clerks, packing-house employes, etc. The grievance of one of these unions will be the fight of all.

Venezuelan Situation
