MARION COUNTY READY

Convention Quiet as a Woman's Conscience

Selects 22 Delegates and Instructs Them For Gatch

The Marion county Republican convention yesterday afternoon was a very harmonious meeting. There was no contest in the organization of the convention, neither was there any strife over any part of its work. It was after 3 o'clock when the committee on credentials finished its report, and further business of the meeting had to be deferred until that was done.

The committee on delegates selected 22 delegates and the action of the committee was ratified. The delegates are as follows:

S. D. Adkins, Dr. F. E. Smith, T. B. Kay, Tom Cornelius, J. J. Murphy, N. H. Looney, W. L. Toozee, Dr. J. N. Smith, A. S. Anderson, Dr. J. A. Richardson, E. E. McKinney, E. P. McCormack, T. B. Jones, E. L. Martin, W. J. Irwin, A. A. Burton, Lee Acheson, H. A. Snyder, J. F. Goodie, J. H. Riches, T. J. Cronise and H. C. Porter.

H. C. Porter offered a resolution instructing the Marion county delegation for Claud Gatch and providing that no member of the delegation be permitted to give a proxy. Adopted.

When the convention had completed its business, Claud Gatch was called for. In presenting the choice of the Marion county convention for the congressional nomination, Chairman Wrightman said he had "the distinguished pleasure of presenting a man whom I hope will be our next congressman." Mr. Gatch said it was a pleasure to him to again lead the delegation from this county to the congressional convention.

While defeated on the first occasion, he thought the prospects were brighter at this time. He announced himself a strong protectionist, and intimated that he would give careful consideration to all legislation affecting the trusts. The candidate further stated that he believed in sound money and believed that this form of stable currency should be extended to the country's new possessions. Mr. Gatch was warmly applauded for his remarks.

At the close of Mr. Gatch's talk there were calls for Mr. Frank Davey, who was defeated by Mr. Gatch for the endorsement as a congressional candidate by the Marion county Republican organization. Mr. Davey made one of his best speeches and assured the successful candidate in the local contest that he would do all in his power to secure for him the nomination at the Eugene convention and afterwards his election by one of the largest Republican majorities ever known in the district. The convention then adjourned after filling a few vacancies in the precinct committeemen.

Socialists Nominate.

John W. Engle, a farmer, residing near Corvallis, was nominated by the Socialists of the First Congressional District, at the convention held in this city Friday afternoon. Mr. Engle is a native of Illinois, and is 54 years of age. He expects to make a thorough canvass of the district in the interest of his candidacy.

A contest occurred in the election of a campaign chairman and secretary, but Marion county won out. R. R. Ryan and G. S. Sherwood, both of this city, were elected to those respective stations by a vote of 33 to 32.

Yakima Hop Contracts

North Yakima, Wash., April 4.—The first hop contract made this spring in the Yakima valley was closed this week and filed with the county auditor, in which 60,000 pounds of the 1903 crop were sold at 16 and 17 cents. This is the largest contract ever made here at this season of the year. The contract was made through A. E. Poole & Co., representing Magnus Soms' Co., of Chicago, Ill., and are as follows: Ed Rowland, 10,000 pounds, 16 cents; W. A. Williams, 6,000 pounds, Zillah; R. D. Herod, 15,000 pounds, Fechter & Janech, 29,000 pounds North Yakima. There yet remains 2000 bales in the hands of the growers of this county, with indications of a downward tendency in the price. Nothing has been sold for more than three weeks. The holders are waiting for a higher price. Twenty-seven cents has been offered for hops here, but it is not likely that this price would be offered at the present time.

How Jarvi Was Caught

Seattle, April 4.—Sheriff Linville, of Astoria, Ore., arrived in Seattle yesterday from Douglas City, Alaska, with Matti Jarvi, whom he arrested there for the murder of Jarvi's father near Astoria a few months ago.

The sheriff found his man working in a gold mine at Douglas City. He was 600 feet under the ground when arrested. As the officer came upon him he was recognized, Jarvi came near fainting. He said he thought he was safe from all law. He was going under an assumed name and had changed his appearance so that it would have been hard for any one other than a person who knew him well to recognize him. Linville did this. He handcuffed his prisoner, held him at Douglas City until the Dolphin sailed for Seattle and then he came home with him. Last night Linville left for Portland with his man.

Sumpter, April 4.—An egg curiosity in the shape of twin eggs is being displayed at the Sumpter Drug Company's store here.
