ENCLOSED ATHLETIC FIELD

Salem's Long-Felt Want to Be Supplied

Grounds Located on Willamette University Campus

Salem is to have an enclosed athletic field. To supply this need, the Willamette University people have taken the initiative. Preliminary work has begun, and will be pushed to completion as funds are made available for the purpose.

The athletic field will be located on the University campus near the gymnasium, and north of the mill race. The site will be properly graded and filled in. Ample room is provided in the plans for the accommodation of all athletic games. The dimensions of the enclosure will be 510x240 feet, and the field will enclose football and baseball grounds of regulation size, a 4 1/2 lap track, 15 feet wide, and a grand stand with a seating capacity of 600 to 800.

Some time since The Journal called attention to the fact that Salem is badly in need of an enclosed athletic field, easy of access for the large number of persons who enjoy attending such games and meets as Salem should have. Last fall the O. A. C. Willamette game, also the Chemawa-Reliance game attested the fact that Salem people are interested in such sports.

The students have taken steps toward securing a proper field. Dr. Coleman and the trustees have taken an interest, and something will be done. Old Willamette is coming forward rapidly, and should be helped on this proposition. Every dollar given for her advancement means two for the benefit resulting to the city.

Several of the business men of the city have voluntarily subscribed to the fund that is to be raised. One hundred and fifty dollars has already been subscribed. It is expected this plan to provide the needed athletic grounds will receive the support and liberal subscriptions of all lovers of sport. PROTECT RIVER FRONT

Greater Salem Commercial Club Working

The executive committee of the Greater Salem Commercial Club, to whom were referred the matters of protecting the river front, and the question of preventing a new channel from breaking through west of the bridge, have been in communication with the United States engineers at Portland, and President Thielsen and Secretary Judah are taking steps to have a map prepared based on government surveys, of the river at this point, showing the encroaching bar, and danger to the west bank and bridge.

Secretary Judah will have a report ready for the meeting of the club next Tuesday evening, at which the main facts will be laid before that body, and steps taken to secure the co-operation of the Oregon delegation for the protection of the Salem harbor. A communication and map will probably be prepared and laid before the war department at Washington.

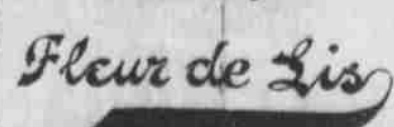
