PORTLAND PAINTERS GO OUT

Two Hundred on Strike Today

Danger of Strike Causing a General Tie Up

Other Trades Will go Out if Non-union Men Work

Portland Or., April 6.—Two hundred painters struck this morning. These men were in the employ of the Master Painter's Association, which refused to grant a minimum scale of \$2.50 per day. Fifty men are working for independent contractors, who are not connected with the association, and who conceded the painters' demands this morning. If non-union painters are employed by the Masters' association, the carpenters, brick layers and others will strike in sympathy.

Rioting In Belgrade

Vienna April 6.—The Belgrade correspondent of the Tagblatt wires that the shop apprentices and messengers started a demonstration against police regulations tonight, and students joined in to lead them. Troops were called out and fired a volley into the ranks of the demonstrators, five of whom were killed and 16 wounded.

Are Using Slow Ships

London April 6.—In the House of Commons today Postmaster-General Chamberlain answering complaints against the slowness of mails since the advent of the American ship combine, said that he was aware slow vessels had been used but he had been assured that these affairs would be remedied after May 5th when fast steamers will be running regularly.

More Russian Conspiracies

St. Petersburg, April 6.—An elaborate conspiracy has been unearthed to assassinate the ministers of religion and the interior. Numerous arrests have been made, and the police are today closing in on the other conspirators.

Injunction Dissolved

Cincinnati, April 6.—In the United States circuit court this afternoon Judge Lorton dissolved the temporary injunction secured some time ago by a minority of the stockholders of the Southern Pacific railway.

JUDGE CALLS IT GAMBLING

Turns Down Chicago Stock Board

Practically Decides it Cannot Appeal to the Courts

And that Local Firms May Use its Quotations

St. Louis, April 6.—Turning its transactions gambling, and denying it a right to resort to courts of equity, Judge Adams, of the United States circuit court, this morning scored the Chicago board of trade in an opinion handed down, refusing the board an injunction against local firms for using its quotations.

Judge Adams says the question is whether the property right of the board of trade may have in its quotations are not tainted with immorality, so as to preclude it from resorting to a court of equity. Quotations result from wagering on the future price of grain or hog products. I am satisfied a very large percentage of the so-called sales for future delivery are merely gambling transactions. There is no purpose on the part of the seller to deliver, and no purpose on the part of the buyer to receive the subject of the sale. Information on prices made in this manner, has, in my opinion, no legitimate tendency to promote the commerce of the country, but, on the contrary, its tendency is only to excite the gambling propensities of the public. As such it is not of the species of property which appeals to a court of conscience for its protection.
