MARION'S FINANCIAL STANDING

Rivals Any Other County in the Entire State

Over \$50,000 Cash Balance in the Treasury

The financial standing of Marion county is good. It rivals in this, as well as many other respects, any other county in the entire state.

The monthly report of County Treasurer Richardson, for the month of March, shows a cash balance in the various funds of the county of over \$50,000. There remains in the hands of the sheriff, in addition to this amount, something like \$100,000 in taxes that have been collected during the past two weeks. As against these assets the only liability which the county has to meet at this time is that of the state taxes, amounting to \$45,588.60. Of course this item of expense is paid out of the general fund of the county, of which there is a cash balance of \$30,000, not taking into consideration the proportion belonging to this fund that will be derived from the large amount of tax money that Sheriff Colbath will soon turn into the treasury.

There remains in the school fund about \$14,000, but this money will be disbursed among the various districts of the county during the present month.
