PENNELL INQUEST TO BEGIN

Object Not go Much to Prove Pennell's Suicide
But to Discover if Possible Who Murdered Burdick

Buffalo, April 7.—It is announced that the three principal witnesses at the Pennell inquest Friday afternoon will be Frederick, brother of the dead man, and administrator of his estate; Thomas Penney, Pennell's college chum and legal representative, and Wallace Thayer, to whom Pennell gave a bond of \$50,000, covering the payment of \$25,000 to Mrs. Burdick. Coroner Murphy issued subpoenas today. Coatsworth this morning said he was not anxious to show Pennell committed suicide, but wanted to bring out the facts as to who murdered Burdick. If living, the murderer must be brought to justice. A reliable source this morning says the story of Pennell being a defaulter, thief and crook was the result of the fight between Penny and Thayer, in connection with Mrs. Burdick's bequest of \$25,000.

LAND OFFICIALS FIRED

A Number of Federal Agents Removed

Miss Ware Who Was the Friend of McKinley

Portland, April 7.—The first step in the prosecutions were taken Monday by Judge Bellinger, who removed H. W. Reed, of Bend, Crook county; J. W. Hamaker, of Bly, Klamath county, and J. O. Mamaker, of Bonanza, Klamath county. A few days ago Miss Marie Ware, commissioner at Eugene, was permitted to resign. A distinct intimation was conveyed to her that a vacancy in her office would be most acceptable to the officials of the interior department. The three other commissioners were summarily removed by Judge Bellinger, at the request of the special officers of the land department, who have been investigating the land frauds.

These removals are to be followed by others in different parts of the state. The special officers who have been investigating the frauds in Oregon have evidence of the gross negligence and fraudulent practices of a number of the United States commissioners, and all of those against whom irregularities are charged will be deprived of their offices. No intimation has yet been conveyed of the number who are to be prosecuted. The first steps in this direction will be taken by the United States attorney's office upon a request from Washington. The reports from the special agents of the interior department have been made direct to the Washington officials in charge of the administration of public land matters and not to the local court officials. At Washington it is expected the department of justice will be put into possession of the evidence accumulated and prosecutions will then be ordered.

Miss Ware is said to have been very active in promoting timber land deals manipulated by Horace McKinley, and his attentions to the young lady have been the subject of much comment. There has been a tremendous run on the state school lands at Salem, and it is believed they are being systematically grabbed up at \$1.25 an acre, when the law will raise the price to \$2.50 next month, and the state board would have power to put that price on them now, and stop the sequestration of these valuable public assets.

Portland Painters

Portland, April 7.—The situation of the building trades is that the Master Painters' Association has declared it will not yield to the union, and demands a fight to a finish. The International Painters' Union is behind the local union and will supply funds.

A HEAVY VOTE IN CHICAGO

Even Money Being Bet on Result as to Mayor

Chicago, April 7.—State reports of the municipal elections show an exceptionally early heavy vote. Chicago cast fully 50 per cent before 9 o'clock. Although the campaign was one of the fiercest in history, no disturbances are reported. Betting is even, and fully half a million was wagered before the polls opened. One of the heaviest bets was made by Bookmaker O'Leary, who placed \$25,000 on Harrison, Gates and Drake taking the other side.
