## SHELL ROASTS CAREY

### Proposed Minister to Argentine

### He Writes Him an Open Valentine

### The Attention of Roosevelt Called to the Facts

There are a great many Republicans who don't understand why Judge Carey, of Portland, should be invited to supersede Judge Lord, minister to Argentine.

Carey was one of Mitchell's lieutenants in his long struggle for reinstatement in the party, and as one of the factors of Senator Mitchell's success Carey is now recommended for this important position.

Carey was one of the crowd that helped defeat Senator Dolph for the alleged reason that they were free silver men, but in reality because they wanted the places. In that kind of fighting Judge Carey has been active, and probably deserves recognition as straight apolis politics goes.

He probably deserves to have Judge Lord's place, in the opinion of Senator Mitchell, and Carey is probably Senator Mitchell's personal appointee, in accordance with his habit of paying his personal obligations in that way.

But that is all that can be claimed for Judge Carey, in the way of claims upon the Republican party or the Oregon delegation. The party nor the delegation owes him anything beyond that fidelity to Mr. Mitchell.

Senator Fulton nor Congressman Williamson owe Judge Carey anything, unless they desire to continue the factional strife in the Republican party by giving him such unusual and international prominence as this appointment would imply.

A hundred men did as much to elect Fulton or Williamson as Carey has done, and some lesser appointment would satisfy all the claim he has on the party in general.

The Republican party organs will not discuss these matters upon their merits. The postoffice organs will be silent at anything the delegation does, even though it makes a mistake.

Judge Lord, as minister to Argentine, has been an unusually capable and dignified foreign minister, in whom the whole state of Oregon could feel a general sense of pride and satisfaction.

His removal to make place for the representative of mere decadent factionalism will not set well with the people of this state, with all deference to President Roosevelt.

Rev. Joseph Scheel, the man who has published so much, and accomplished so much to expose the timber land frauds in Oregon, has repeatedly accused Judge Carey with shielding these questionable transactions.

His charges have not been denied. His accusations, whenever fairly and fully investigated, and probed to the bottom, have been found to be true in the main.

Rev. Scheel is firm in his purpose to expose, one after another, of the federal land ring in Oregon. Time and tide and the facts in the case are working in his favor. The hoodlers in public lands must be driven out.

Below is published a letter which Rev. Scheel has addressed to Judge Carey, and we publish it as a part of the political history of Oregon, and time will vindicate his estimation of the seriousness of the situation. If President Roosevelt does not see fit to recognize the unfitness of Judge Carey now for such a high appointment, he will be brought face to face with the truth some day. Let him give Carey something if need be, but not the greatest diplomatic appointment due this state! Here is the Scheel letter:

"Rumor has it that you are recommended to succeed W. P. Lord, as minister to the Argentine Republic, the post paying \$10,000 per year. There will be some serious difficulties before you get there. I am not a politician and am not working behind your back, and I have no second purpose. I have found you helping the timber swindlers, and your name can be found in the department of the interior about it. The government does not owe you anything since you were helping the many frauds against it, and it would seem mighty funny if President Roosevelt would cease for a moment to be himself to favor your recommendation."
