

CASCADE OF FIRE IN YOSEMITE

One of the Sights for the President

Dynamite will Awaken a Thousand Echoes

Glacier Point 3000 Feet High to Be Illuminated

The Yosemite valley commission will make the visit of President Roosevelt to the famous valley a memorable one. He will be given a salute by a battery of dynamite cartridges, the effect of which will exceed anything the president has ever heard in his war experiences.

The walls of the valley are three thousand feet sheer and the report of a toy pistol within them reverberates up and down and around the valley, sounding like a series of volleys by heavy artillery. The explosion of a battery of dynamite cartridges is expected to produce most extraordinary results.

Chris. Jorgensen, the artist has notified the commissioners that he will place his cottage, the most beautiful and commodious in the valley, at the disposal of the president during the latter's stay.

An enormous bonfire will be built on the overhanging rock of Glacier point, the dimensions of the illuminations being only limited by the surface area of the rock. The great mass of fire will be thrown over the side of the projecting rock to the bottom of the valley 3,000 feet below, and the presidential party will witness a streak of fire such as few have ever had an opportunity to see. Other appropriate spectacular effects are being prepared for the presidential visit.

RAILROAD MEN'S WATCHES.

They Must Be Good Ones and Regularly Compared and Inspected.

A man with smoke ground into his hands and face walked into one of the downtown jewelry stores and handed over a big gold watch and a card. The repair man looked at the watch, made some queer marks on the card and handed both back. And the man walked out of the store.

"Didn't know you sell on the installment plan," suggested the inquisitive loafer.

"Don't," was the laconic response, and then the jeweler explained. "The man is a locomotive fireman, and his watch was being compared. You see, it is absolutely necessary that railroad watches keep good time, and the matter of making them keep good time has been systematized."

"The firemen, engineers, conductors, rear brakemen and train masters on all of the roads in this country have orders to have their watches compared twice a month and inspected every six months. On some roads nearly all of the employees are supposed to go through this same routine."

"When a watch is bought by any of these men, it must be passed upon by the jeweler who has been appointed inspector for the road that the purchaser serves. It must be a good watch, costing about \$35 for the works alone, for the rattle and jolt of a train would seriously affect a cheap watch, but it may be of any make, provided it comes up to the standard. Stop watches, watches that tell the day of the week and such complicated novelties are barred. A key winder is not acceptable, nor is a watch that has been changed from a hunting case to an open face. An open faced watch is preferred, though a good hunting case watch is not turned down on the majority of roads."

"After the inspector has passed favorably upon the watch he makes out a slip to that effect and returns the watch to the railroad, along with the insuring slip and a small card. On this card are a number of ruled spaces. Twice a month the railroad brings his watch and card to the inspector, who notes on the card whether the watch was fast or slow and how much, whether it has stopped or run down and whether or not he regulated it. In this manner the inspector can tell just what the watch is doing and what it needs."

"At the end of each six months the watch and the card are taken to the inspector, who makes a more careful examination of the watch, issues a new card to the railroad and sends in the old card to the headquarters of the road for which the card is kept in a book by the inspector."

"The railroad watches that are most closely watched by the inspectors are those that are carried by engineers and firemen on those locomotives that are fitted with electric headlights on account of the danger of their becoming magnetized. This danger is realized by engineers, and many of them leave their watches in the cab while working about the headlight."—Indianapolis News.

CITIZENS COUNCIL ACTIVE

In Promoting Public Business

Cannery Wants Part of Twelfth Street

Will aid Ladies in Beautifying Marion Square

The following subjects engaged the attention of the city council Tuesday night: Marion square improvement, Twelfth street sidewalks, enforcement of ordinance requiring corporations to paint their telegraph, telephone and electric light poles, and concessions for a summer theater. An offer from Mr. and Mrs. W. Breyman was received, proposing the dedication of a public drinking fountain; initial steps were taken to enforce the license ordinance against the Billies and Commercial clubs, and A. B. Kurtz, of Silverton, made application for an electric lighting franchise. These subjects are treated in another column in this issue.

Twelfth Street Sidewalks.

Street Commissioner Griswold called attention to the condition of the sidewalk on Twelfth street, between State street and the mill race. He said that in 1871 the Willamette University people ceded to the city a strip of land 4 feet wide off the east end of the campus for street purposes, with the understanding that the city construct a sidewalk along that property, and keep the same in perpetual repair. The street commissioner said that the condition of the walk is such that it must be repaired in some manner. In connection with the same subject, he stated that a similar strip of land was ceded by the University at the same time to the Wallace estate, owners of the cannery, which has been succeeded by the Oregon Canning Company, with G. W. Holcomb, as manager. It is the expressed intention of Mr. Holcomb, he said, to make use of this strip of land by erecting thereon an additional building that will extend 34 feet into Twelfth street from the present buildings, to the obstruction of that thoroughfare. He quoted sections of the Oregon road law to the effect that after a lapse of 10 years a thoroughfare that has during that time been recognized as a street, shall be a county road.

Claim Part of Street.

C. A. Park, for the cannery people, said that the resolution that had been offered, had been unsanctioned only within the past month, and that the present owners of the cannery, being innocent purchasers of the property, should not be compelled to be governed by the conditions expressed in the resolution. He intimated that if the council shall insist on the appropriation to the city of the strip of land adjoining the cannery property, the management of this important plant may remove its business to Portland, where a larger plant is being operated by the same company.

The matter was finally referred to the committee on streets and public property, with power to employ legal advice.

Will Aid the Ladies.

A committee, consisting of Mrs. D. J. Fry, Mrs. A. N. Moore and Mrs. S. P. Kimball, from the Marion Square Improvement League, appeared before the council, and their request for assistance from the city in the work of beautifying the square was granted.

Council, by unanimous vote, gave permission for the removal of the unsightly building now in the square, the erection of a neat pavilion, band stand and the installing of a water fountain by the league. It was also agreed by the council to further aid the ladies in their commendable work by providing a curbing along the west line of Commercial street, the building of needed cross-walks, and furnishing lights for the square.

Want Posts Painted.

A. Huckestein and H. D. Patton, representing the Greater Salem Commercial Club, requested the council to take steps to compel all corporations in this city to paint their poles, in the interest of the general appearance of the city. Stolz moved that the city recorder and city marshal notify all corporations operating a pole system in this city to paint all of their poles for a distance of 20 feet from the ground. Carried.

For Summer Theater.

H. D. Patton requested permission for the erection of a temporary frame structure at the corner of Commercial and Center streets, in which to hold a summer theater, between June 15th

and September 15th. Referred to committee on streets and public property with power to act.

Street Department.

The quarterly report of Street Commissioner Griswold showed receipts amounting to \$1452, with \$177.76 expenditures, leaving a cash balance of \$1274.24. During the quarter 1384 days work without team was performed on the streets, at a cost of \$210.70, also 36 days' work with teams, at a cost of \$99. Total amount paid out \$309.70.

To Build Gravel Barge.

The city has contracted with J. W. Young, for \$200, for the construction of a gravel barge, to be used in transporting gravel between Minto's gravel bar and this city. This will be the source of the city's supply of gravel for street purposes.

New Boiler Ordered.

The action of Mayor Bishop and Recorder Judah, under previous order of the council, in ordering a new boiler for the Silsby engine in the Salem fire department, at a cost of \$850, was ratified.

Street Improvements.

Recorder Judah reported that the necessary ordinances for the grading of Church, High and Ferry streets are being prepared by Attorney W. T. Slater. On motion it was voted to hold an adjourned meeting next Tuesday evening to receive the ordinance providing for this work. The city engineer was instructed to proceed with the setting of the grade stakes for the contemplated street improvement.

New Ordinances.

A number of new ordinances were introduced, as follows: One fixing the rate of licenses to be collected on nickel-in-the-slot machines at \$2.50 per month for small machines and \$4 per month for the large machines; another amending the general license ordinance of the city, so as to provide for increased licenses; two others changing the grade on Twelfth street. All were read twice and referred to the committee on ordinances.

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KURTZ LIGHTING PROJECT

Offers to Make Cut in Rates

Referred to the Committee Which Will Act

A. B. Kurtz, who operates an electric lighting plant at Silverton, appeared before the Salem city council Tuesday evening, and solicited terms under which he may be granted and permitted to enter the city of Salem in competition with other companies.

Mr. Kurtz was given an audience by the council, and stated that his company is at the present time lighting the cities of Silverton, Mt. Angel and Woodburn. Having ample power in addition to that required for this service, he said the company is desirous of entering the Salem field. He assured the council that he agrees to furnish lights at a reasonable cost; that it is the intention of the company to furnish lights at the rate of 50 cents per month for incandescent lights and 95 cents per month for enclosed street arc lights of 600 Watts power, or nearly equivalent to 1200 candle power, and not at any time to charge to exceed one-half cent per hour for each 16-candle power incandescent lamp. Mr. Kurtz asked for the appointment of a committee to which might be referred the subject, that a franchise might be determined upon, under the operation of which the new company could enter the Salem field with its service. He informed the council further that he is willing to furnish a sufficient bond for the faithful performance on his part of any obligation he might assume under any franchise he might become a party to.

Stolz deemed the subject of too great importance to the interests of the city to be hurriedly disposed of, since it involved possibly the life and permanency of one of the city's principal corporations. A motion by Mr. Stolz prevailed for a reference of the matter to the committee on licenses, with instructions to report at the adjourned meeting, to be held next Tuesday evening.
