OREGON CROP REPORT.

The weekly crop bulletin published by section director Edward S. Bonis, Portland, April 7th, has the following:

The past week has been cool and showery, with some high winds and frequent light frosts. The soil is in excellent condition for plowing and seeding and this work, as a rule, has progressed satisfactorily. Fall wheat and forage plants in all parts of this state have made fairly good growth, and pasturage is much improved. Stock is thinner in flesh than usual at this season of the year, and on account of the weak condition of the ewes, the loss of lambs has been heavy. Angora goat shearing in the western section of the state is nearly completed and the clip is an average one.

Hop yards have been cleaned and cultivated, and the hops have started to grow. Early gardens have been planted, except in the high level sections of the state.

Fruit trees came through the winter in excellent shape; fruit buds have been held back by the cool weather, and only a small proportion of the earliest varieties are now in bloom.

Willamette Valley.

Mist, Columbia county, J. W. Jones.—Cloudy and cool, with some rain; farm work progressing finely; greater part of crops in; stock doing well.

Terry, Multnomah county, William Sales.—Crops are good; spring grain growing well. Cold rain during the last two days will probably injure early fruit.

Dille Washington county, Wm. R. Stephens.—Seedling progressing favorably. Crops in good condition; some light frosts but not heavy enough to do any damage. Fruit is being held back by cool weather.

New Era, Clackamas county, G. H. Brown.—Grain is looking well for this time of year. The cold weather during the past few days kept crops and fruit back. Some peaches and other early fruits in blossom.

Fairdale, Yamhill county, N. G. Fairchild.—Weather very changeable, sunshine, rain, frost and some snow. But little farming and gardening done. Grass is growing nicely.

Jefferson, Marion county, E. S. Longacre.—Spring backward; recent showers caused grass and grain to start. The ground is in good condition for plowing, and farmers are rushing their work.

Salem, R. P. D. No. 1, Polk county, P. F. Clark.—Warm showers, favorable for fall sown crops, grass and fruit buds. Goat shearing almost done. Sheep are picking up and cattle begin to look better; prospects for all kinds of fruit good; spring seeding almost done; orchard pruning and spraying in progress.

Brownsville, Linn county, Peter Hume.—Week generally favorable for growing. Some rain, but not excessive.

Blackley, Lane county, L. W. S. Post.—Wet and cold; heavy frosts at night. Some snow Saturday morning; buds swelling, no blossoms yet; not much gardening on account of wet weather; grass very slow in starting.
