Commercial wireless telegraphy at a rate of one cent a word from Chicago to all the principal cities in the United States will be a fact within sixty days if the present plans of the American De Forrest Wireless Telegraph Company are carried out. A statement to this effect was given out on Wednesday at the Chicago office of the company by Abraham White, president of the corporation, and Dr. Lee De Forrest, the inventor.

"We have purchased a tract of ground from the Northwestern University in North Evanston," said Mr. White. "There we will erect a station 210 feet high. Our engineers are expected to arrive in a day or so and work will begin at once. It will take about forty days to erect the station. We expect to have it in operation and to be sending messages to Detroit, Cleveland, Buffalo and places on the Atlantic coast inside of sixty days."
