

## Desert and Arid Lands to Be ANOTHER WONDER OF SCIENCE. Excloited Next

The Sacramento Bee made vigorous war on the land offices in California for some time and to such purpose that much of the fraudulent land entry business was stopped. However, in a recent issue it comments on the evil and, quoting from an article in the New York Herald, comments as follows:

The New York Herald of recent date contains a page article by J. D. Whopley, a member of the Herald bureau staff at Washington, D. C., showing that at the present rate there will be no public lands left for settlement within five years. Mr. Whelploy's article is a caustic arraignment of the methods of the Unit ed States Land Office, and it is one which is borne out by the acquaintance the Sacramento public has recently gained through the Hee concerning those mthods. He shows up at great length and attention to detall the monstrous frauds which are carried on under the very eyes of the Land Office, and which receive no word of rebuke from that quarter, He proves that individuals without funds of their own have been em ployed to make entries for others with large capital who have paid the expenses, and that some wealthy speculators have made enormous fortunes. Says the New York Herald: "The fact that so large a part of the nation's resources has gone into the control of a few individuals or corporations is not the most serious effect of the laws. The principal injury consists in the loss of control of millions of acres of timber land to which future generations of Amer ican citizens must look not only for their supply of timber and timber products, but for protection to the supply of water upon which will depend the fertile and most of the agricultural lands of the West. The Desert Land Act was placed upon the statute books in the first instance to onable a few wealthy men to acquire vast hodies of land in California. The facilities it gave to rich men to obtain land on an extensive scale resulted in making the act applicable to all of our arid and semi-arid States

With reference to timber and stone frauds, of which those exposed last summer in Sacramento by the Bee were among the most shameful, the New York Herald article states:

"It is evident from the small number of investigations of lands taken up under the Timber and Stone Act. the Desert Land act and the commutation clause for the Homestead Act. during the last ten years, that the necessity of securing the public lands against fraudulent entries and final proofs is now considered of less importance than it was formerly.

"An official statement made by Secretary Lamar stands out in sharp contrast, for it appears that fraudulent land entries covering 400,000 acres were canceled in the two years prior to 1887. It is not necessary to state that fraudulent land entries are being made as frequently now as at \$3.70; any previous time, for there never has been in the life of this nation a time when public lands have been taken \$23. up as rapidly as now, with such a small corresponding increase in the population.
