SAVED MANY LIVES

Elevator Boy Sticks Bravely to His Post

And Carries the Frightened Guests to Safety

New York, April 10.—Occupants of two Fifth avenue apartment houses and guests of the Victoria Hotel were driven from their beds by a fire this morning, which threatened to destroy the entire block. There were many narrow escapes. An elevator boy discovered the fire and gave the alarm. He stuck to his post, undoubtedly saving many. He took out Miss Huntington and a relative, Kate Collins, Miss Penfield, the artist, and Miss Leiter, a niece of the Chicago millionaire, and cousin of Lady Curzon, vicereine of India.

Tony Pastor, Pete Daley and Bandmaster Dusa escaped through the smoke. Captain Zallinski, inventor of the dynamite gun used by the United States, who is a cripple, was rescued with difficulty from the top floor of an apartment house. The Victoria hotel was damaged by smoke only. The fire started in a warehouse in the center of the block, which suffered the greatest damage. The loss is 100,000.

Czarina Is all Right

St. Petersburg, April 10.—It is officially announced this morning that the reports of the Czarina's illness are entirely untrue. She is in perfect health, and leaves here for Moscow with the Czar.

To Declare Him Insane

Indianapolis, April 10.—An effort to railroad Cantrell, the ghoul king, to the asylum was frustrated this morning by Magistrate Emrich. Physicians secretly brought insanity proceedings, but the magistrate refused to hear them, and postponed the matter until May 4th. It was alleged that it was a plan to discredit Cantrell's testimony against Dr. Alexander.

Following the attempt to get Cantrell to the insane asylum, the prosecuting attorney announced that Alexander's trial would be indefinitely postponed, which is taken to mean that he will never be tried. Cantrell and the entire gang of ghouls have refused to testify, or he would be tried at once. The Martin trial begins Tuesday, and Cantrell's April 20th. The negroes became angry and decided not to testify, because they allege enmity was shown them by the prosecutor.

Schaffer is on Hand.

Columbus, April 10.—President Schaffer and other members of the wage committee of the Amalgamated Iron and Steel Workers, arrived here today, and began a conference, preliminary to opening the national convention next Tuesday.

Anti-Mormon Corporation.

Columbus, April 10.—The National anti-Mormon Missionary Association was incorporated today, to carry on a campaign against Mormonism, wherever the latter faith has gained a foothold, or where missionaries are working.

Pilots Were Careless.

U. S. Judge DeHaven this morning decided the wreck of the Rio Janeiro, on Washington's birthday, 1901, was due to the gross negligence of Pilot Jordan and Captain Ward, in trying to enter the harbor in a dense fog. He limits the liability of the company to \$25,000. The claims against the company are half a million.

CHANNEL SOUNDED TODAY

Government Engineers Examine Harbor Conditions

Will Compare With Survey of 1896 and Note Changes

David B. Ogden, engineer of the government river and harbor department, arrived from Portland last night, and early this morning, with a crew of three men, took soundings of the river in the vicinity of the bridge. The last survey was made in 1896, and a comparison with the soundings taken by Mr. Ogden today will show the exact change in the channel.

Mr. Ogden finds indications of much cutting into the bank of the Polk county side of the river; also that the gravel bar above the bridge has been lengthened. It will be impossible for him to make any definite statement of condition until his soundings, made today, are reduced to the low water standard. When this is done, and a comparison of the two surveys is made, the Commercial Club will be able to properly prepare maps, to be sent to Washington, showing the danger to the bridge and wharfage.

Mr. Ogden will meet a committee of the Commercial Club this afternoon, and tomorrow leave for Independence, to inspect some stone, which is to be used in the new revetment work about that city.

Bacolod Captured

Manila, April 10.—Bacolod, on the island of Mindanao, was captured Wednesday by Captain Pershing's forces. A hundred Moros were killed and many wounded. The American casualties were three wounded.

Shaw's battalion of the 27th infantry, Chacaur's battery, Kilpatrick's troop of the 15th cavalry participated in the engagement, which was precipitated by the Moros opposing Pershing's advance along the west coast, where he was surveying. The Moros fled without warning. Their stronghold was surrounded, shelled and then rushed. The American charge was terrific. Bayonets were used with terrible effect. Among the killed is Datto Panandungan, who had been professing friendship.

The Moros, after a brave fight, fled, and the town is completely occupied by the Americans.

A friendly force of Moros was with the Americans when the attack was made. After the battle the fortress was destroyed. Pershing had been making these visits since early last December, and today was the first serious opposition. The natives of Bacolod have been hostile for some time, refusing all overtures of friendship. It is probable, in view of this fact that the natives defeated today were ring leaders in opposition to the Americans, and that the encounter will result in general recognition of the Americans in all the boroughs.

Knox Gets The Credit

Washington, April 10.—Attorney-General Knox is receiving congratulations today over the outcome of the Northern Securities case. It is generally believed here the appeal will be speedily decided, and the lower court sustained.

Ten new directors of the Rubber Goods Manufacturing Company were elected yesterday at New York, and six of the old board. There will be no change in the management.

HOLLAND STRIKE IS ENDED

It Looked like Civil War for a Few Days

Fortunate Ending of a Serious Situation

Amsterdam, April 10.—The strikers' committee decided this morning that the strike should end at noon today. There were no disturbances today, nor demonstrations, it being a religious holiday, which was generally observed.

The Prohi's Nominate

Newberg, April 10.—April 10.—The Prohibitionists of the First Congressional district met in convention here Thursday afternoon, and placed W. P. Elmore, of Brownsville, in nomination for congress. A strong prohibition platform was adopted and rousing speeches were made by Mrs. H. D. Harford, state president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union; Rev. H. Gould, Prof. R. W. Reisey and others. The sum of over \$150 was raised for the purpose of carrying on the campaign. The well-known Meneley quartet and Professor and Mrs. Lough, of the East, were present and furnished appropriate music for the occasion.

Shamrock the Second

New York, April 10.—Fire this morning in the Erie basin threatened to destroy Lipton's Shamrock II, which was the challenger two years ago, and which since then has been housed here. A portion of the shed was destroyed, but the yacht was uninjured.

Daly's Bond Approved.

Washington, April 9.—The bond of John D. Daly, recently appointed surveyor-general for Oregon, was received at the general land office today, and approved by the acting commissioner. It did not reach Secretary Hitchcock, however, hence Mr. Meldrum's tenure of office is prolonged one day. Mr. Daly's bond is for \$30,000, furnished by the American Bonding Company of Baltimore. When the bond is finally approved by Secretary Hitchcock, Daly will be advised by wire to relieve Meldrum of the cares of the office.

Same Old Accident.

Elizabeth, N. J., April 10.—As an engine was leaving the round-house on the Central Railway this morning, the rails spread, and the engine was turned over on its side, killing the engineer and fireman, and fatally injuring a brakeman.
