Special Arrangements Made for the Entertainment and Welcome of All Visitors

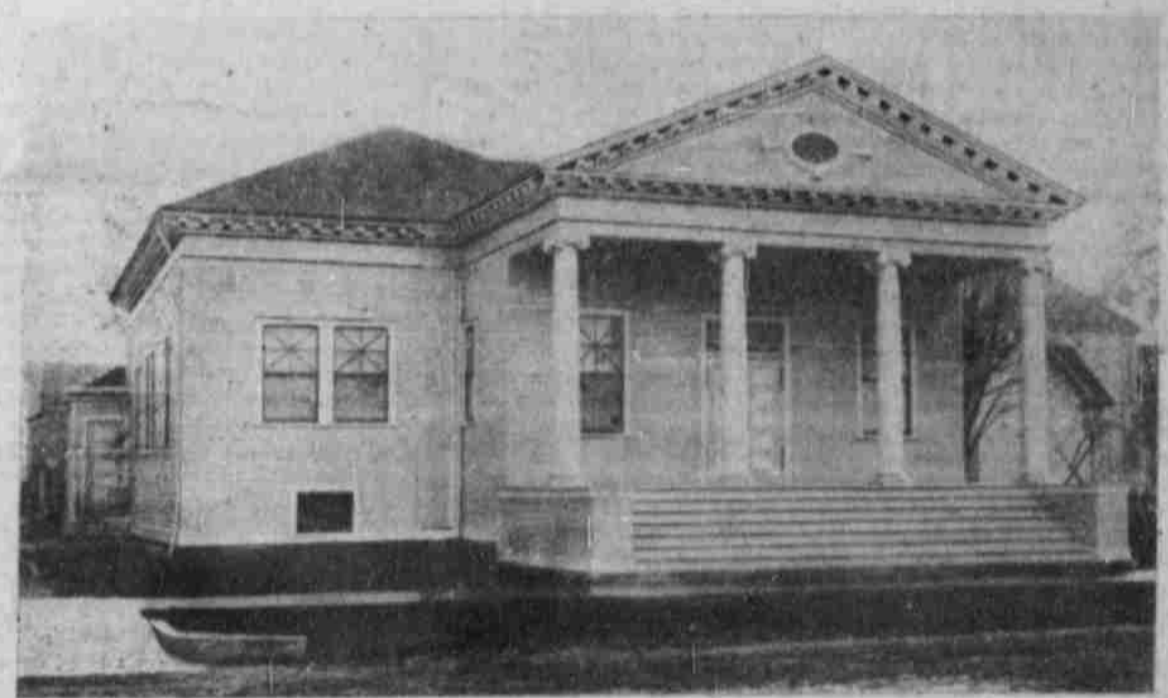
There will be dedicated in Salem on Easter Sunday the new home of the Second Church of Christ, Scientist, which is located on Chemeketa street, next to the City Hall. This is the first building erected in the state for this purpose, and the opening services tomorrow will be attended by many Salem people as well as by a large delegation of Christian Scientists from Portland and other points. The latter have engaged a special car, and will come up in a body on Sunday morning, returning the same day. Special street car service will be provided for their transportation to the city and back to their train.

and special arrangements have been made for their entertainment at a leading restaurant. In order to accommodate the large number of strangers as well as the people of Salem, a repetition of the dedicatory service will be given at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon and it is said the local Christian Scientists are making every possible arrangement for the accommodation of all. Printed invitations have been sent to people of their own denomination at outside points, but Salem people of all denominations are invited and expected to attend. The afternoon meeting is largely for the accommodation of persons attending regular services at some of the other churches, but who would like to be present at this dedication. All will be welcomed.

The total cost of this new church home has been about \$5000, and in accordance with the custom of Christian Science organizations will be dedicated free of debt. No contributions will be asked at this dedicatory service, and no collection will be taken.

History of the Church.

The nucleus of this organization was formed in Salem about ten years ago, and the church proper was organized with about thirty members some four years since. It has grown steadily since that time until it has a strong membership. They have held services for some years at 229 Liberty street, and as the old quarters seemed to have become cramped, it was decided about a year ago to build a church of their own, and their present new building is the outgrowth.

The New Structure is built in semi-classical or what is

Oregon pine, and has been done in a manner that is especially creditable. The contractors can always be proud of the work done on this building, for they have fully satisfied the demands made upon their skill and faithfulness. The basement contains a large furnace put in by T. M. Barr, and there are also convenient toilet facilities in it. The main auditorium is built in modern style, with a sloping floor, thus giving the audience much better facilities for seeing the readers. The ceiling is finished with heavy panels, and is lighted with an electric globe at each intersection of the same. The facade or porch is studded with four heavy columns leading to the entrance of double doors, at either side of which is placed an electric torch for lighting the outside. On the right of the hallway is a commodious reading room, with another similar room beyond. The auditorium is at the end of the hall and to the left. At the other side of the hall is a cloak room, through which the stairs leading to the basement are reached. The building is lighted throughout with most attractive electric fixtures, and the rostrum has a skylight above it, which produces a very easy light for the readers during the day. At the left of the rostrum is a small study room for the readers, which is reached either from the auditorium or by an outside entrance. The rooms are carpeted with heavy velvet carpets and rugs to match, and the archways are hung with handsome draperies. The windows are of ground glass, and the smaller rooms are provided with attractive curtains. The pews were made in Salem by

an open meeting at 7:30 p. m., when the friends can see the new church fully illuminated. The public is cordially invited to all these meetings.

Good Friday.

New York, April 10.—There was general observance of Good Friday in this city. The six exchanges of the city—New York Stock, Consolidated Stock, Cotton, Coffee, Produce and Metal—suspended business, and there was no sugar market. Of the large financial houses only the banks were open for business. Services were held in nearly all the churches, with special observances of the hours between 12 and 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

Shaniko, the terminus of the Columbia Southern railroad, in Wasco county, has had an epidemic of smallpox, which is now under control. The first patient was a timber locator, and he was doctor for poison oak, dying on the third day. There have been seven cases in the past week.

The women in Portland who are going to run the Lewis and Clark fair, or a woman's department thereof, have fallen out, and the two factions have each struck, one against the other.
