Doctors Positive that Patients Have Lumpy Jaw

It is now a well established fact that human being can and do contract actinomycosis, or "lumpy jaw," the same as cattle, except that cattle become inoculated from germs, which are found in grains and grasses, and people contract the disease from eating the meat from an animal afflicted with lumpy jaw.

At the present time there are three well defined cases in this city and vicinity, all of which are being treated by Dr. J. P. Atwood, who, within the past year, has treated six or seven cases.

Two of the patients, Mr. Bowman and Mr. Stone, died, and two now being treated, have undergone surgical operations in the hope of eradicating the disease, which is possible, when it makes its appearance on the surface of the body first, provided it is treated in time.

Dr. S. F. Herdlen has made a careful microscopic examination of the bacilli taken from the human patient and compared it with the bacilli taken from a steer known to have "lumpy jaw." The germs are identical, thus leaving no room for doubt as to the character of the disease which afflicts the human patient.

NOVEL PRISON REFORM.

Italy Proposes Compensation For Men Unjustly Condemned.

A new criminal bill is about to be discussed in Italy, and it is thought in Rome that it will be passed, says the Chicago Tribune. It proposes to concede to those found to have been unjustly condemned to prison an indemnity to be decided upon by the courts.

If the person has been in prison through a real judicial error, the indemnity will in some way correspond to the financial loss which he and his family have sustained, while if he has been condemned through the bad faith of a third person, through false testimony (for which, of course, the court which condemned him is not responsible), the indemnity will be less, but at least he will have the wherewithal to begin life anew.

It has been proposed to indemnify those living when the law passes who have already been released from unmerited condemnations or the families of those who have died while undergoing unjust sentence.
