## Shamrock Dismantled

### Caught in a Squall Her Masts go by the Board

### HER DECK IS CLEANED BUT HULL NOT DAMAGED

### Sir Thomas Lipton Knocked Down the Companion way and one Man Drowned

Weymouth, April 17.—While on a trial spin this morning the new challenger, Shamrock III, had everything carried away by the wind. The challenger is left a mere hulk. The accident took place immediately after she set sail on the port tack. She had left the harbor, and was proceeding slowly, when a sudden squall struck her and carried away everything above board. The yacht is completely dismantled. The big mainmast fell over the side into the water, carrying with it the immense top hamper, hal-yards, rigging and clouds of canvas. No word from the yacht has reached the shore yet. She will undoubtedly be refitted at once, it is thought, with heavier spars. The accident recalls the fact that Shamrock II was similarly wrecked in a trial spin two years ago with King Edward and Lipton aboard, but fortunately no one was hurt.

Glasgow, April 17.—Official information says Shamrock III has no duplicate spars. The disaster, accordingly means that Lipton will apply to have the dates for the cup races set back. A new spar will be obtained from America, probably that of Shamrock II. Designer Watson, when interviewed today, reserved his opinion as to the cause of the accident. The hull is shown, by investigation, to have escaped injury. Lipton narrowly escaped the fate of the steward, when the latter was swept overboard. He was struck by another sailor and knocked down the hatchway with sufficient force to break the wooden teak cover on the cabin floor. His hand is badly lacerated and shoulder bruised. Three of the crew are injured, one sustaining a severe scalp wound. Lipton is much grieved over the accident.

London, April 17.—The Press Association has a dispatch stating that one man has lost his life and several others injured in the Shamrock accident. The Central News asserts that Sir Thomas Lipton was aboard, and was knocked down the main hatchway. The steward, named Collins, was lost overboard, and a sailmaker, Ratzke, also went overboard.

## Governor Escapes SURE CURE USED

St. Louis, April 17.—It is now believed that Lieutenant-Governor Lee succeeded in escaping on the train to Chicago. He is regarded as a fugitive, and all trains are being watched. It is now given out as an open secret that four senators will be indicted at Jefferson City for bribery, and 12 others are under suspicion. Two others will also be indicted for perjury, on evidence found by the St. Louis special grand jury.

St. Louis, April 17.—No news of Lee up to 2 o'clock. It is stated on the best authority that Lee may be indicted for perjury by the Cole county grand jury, as a result of his testimony before that body, and later before the St. Louis inquirers regarding the legislative bribery.

This Ought to Solace Him. London, April 17.—News of the accident to Shamrock III was telegraphed to King Edward at Malta. He sent Sir Thomas a message of sympathy.

## Fitzsimmon's Wife is Dead

New York, April 17.—Mrs. Robert Fitzsimmons, wife of the pugilist, died at her home in Benson Hurst of typhoid pneumonia today.

Fitzsimmons sobs like a child over his wife's death. He refuses to see any one or be comforted. The dead woman's maiden name was Rose Julian, and she was one of a family of acrobats.

## TO SOLVE BARREL MYSTERY

### Case of Counterfeiters Goes Over Until Saturday

### Believed Victim was Lured from New Orleans

New York, April 17.—In order to give the police time for further investigation into the barrel mystery, the examination of the alleged Mafia prisoners and counterfeiters has gone over until tomorrow. The police are closed mouthed, but it is said they have information secured from the papers seized when Moretti, the alleged Mafia leader, was arrested, that will lead to other arrests today. The victim's identity is still unknown. The police have wired the New Orleans police to investigate the matter, as it is believed the man was lured from there.

## Officer Suicides

St. Louis, April 17.—Lieutenant Thomas Howard, U. S. A., committed suicide in the hospital at Jefferson Barracks early this morning, just after the nurse left. He slashed his throat and arms with a razor. He has been in poor health for years, and this was the cause of his act. He attained considerable distinction in the service.

## CHICAGO TROUBLES OVER

### Striking Gas Teamsters Returned to Their Work

### The Row was Between Union Teamsters and Employers

Chicago, April 17.—Trouble between the allied teaming interest and 20,000 union teamsters was averted this morning, when the striking gas teamsters, who went out in sympathy with the gas works men, returned to work. An ultimatum was issued that unless they did so all agreements with local unions would be cancelled.

## His Crime Expiated

### Elliott Lyons Hanged at Eugene this Morning

### MOUNTED SCAFFOLD WITHOUT ASSISTANCE

### His Last Words Were May God Forgive You People for You Know Not What You Do

Eugene, Or., April 17.—Edward Elliott Lyons, the slayer of Sheriff Withers, this morning, at 9:31 o'clock, dropped to his death through the scaffold floor in the jail yard at Eugene, in explanation of the crime of killing Sheriff Withers, February 5th, of this year, near Waiton, Siuslaw valley.

Fisk, and composed of Deputy Harry Brown, Wallace Chamberlain, Shelton Jenkins, J. J. Elwood, Jno. Jones and Revs. H. A. Green and F. E. Billington, all of whom were with him on the scaffold. He walked bravely and mounted the steps without assistance. He took his place, and clinched his fists, determined to display no nervousness.

The hanging went without the slightest accident. His neck was broken by the fall, and but for the voluntary convulsing of the body as it swung to and fro, there was not a sign of life after he reached the end of the rope. Drs. Paine and Day pronounced the man dead after he had hung 14 minutes.

"Elliott Lyons, have you anything to say before the execution," questioned the sheriff. "No, only this. I thank every one who has been kind to

When the ministers had finished Lyons's voice was raised in prayer. He offered a really splendid petition. It was the only time when he showed signs of breaking down. He wept bitterly as he prayed. He bade goodbye to the guards and his other friends by shaking hands. He fell into the procession, headed by Sheriff
