MODERATION IS NECESSARY.

The Journal believes that a policy of moderation is very important just at present in the true interest of labor organizations.

The manufacturers' association of the United States is up in arms, paving the way for a general shut-down of factories.

At Portland and other cities the labor organizations are threatening a tie-up of all industries.

Between the shut-downs and the tie-ups there will be a very pretty state of affairs brought about before long.

The Journal believes that for our little city there should be a general policy of moderation on the part of labor unions.

Let not this community be retarded in its growth or blocked in its development by any unreasonable demands on either side.

The population of Salem can be doubled in the next five years, the value of all property doubled, the number of laborers employed can be quadrupled under the right policies.

These policies must be conservative, conservative and permanent. The man who looks only for immediate advantage is an unwise leader.

Let the labor organizations of this city wisely adhere to policies that will give stability to their orders, and permanence to employment.

EPIDEMIC AT STANFORD.

It seems remarkable that there should be a typhoid fever epidemic at Stanford University.

That all the provisions of modern wealth and discoveries of material science should not protect human life is a mystery.

Where unnumbered millions have been poured out to procure perfect sanitary conditions, and where bacteriologists swarm by the scores on big salaries, an epidemic should be well-nigh impossible.

Would it not appear that these epidemics and infectious diseases are the creation of mistaken theories, rather than the outcome of germs?

The germ theory has received some rude shocks of late, and none more curiously jarring in its nature than that an epidemic should attack the pacific coast stronghold of materialistic philosophy.

Following from the Corvallis Times is scarcely according to the International scale: A tyro of sleek looking individuals, constituting the state board of examiners of barbers, were in town Tuesday. They surveyed the interior of the city's barber shops, looked wise and invited the workmen to dig up a dollar apiece for the

privilege of earning a living in this manner, and for the "protection" of the business and the shaving public, and furthermore, incidentally, to pay each member of the board four dollars a day and expenses. The board provided each shop with a copy of the rules and regulations governing shops. They provide that the barber shall not allow his finger nails to grow long, for obvious reasons, and they are to be kept clean; that a razor shall be cleaned after being used on a person with the smallpox or a dead man; that the same towel shall not be used on more than half a dozen persons, whether the patron grumbles or not; the use of anesthetics for painless shaving is strictly prohibited; attention of the operator is not to be diverted by political or religious discussion in the shop; workmen are to confine their statements within the range of possibility, and no barber is to allow waste hair to accumulate under his chair to deceive the public as to the amount of business he is doing. The rules contain much else on similar lines, all of which the barbers were enjoined to strictly observe.

OREGON HOP SITUATION

Reports from Growers of Two States

A New Pest of the Vine has Appeared

The hop situation remains about the same, few sales are reported, and dealers have but little to say. Some of the large Eastern hop brokers are convinced that the price of hops during the coming season will not be so low as formerly. Many are now making contracts for the 1903 crop at prices ranging from 15 to 16 cents per pound. Few sales of the 1902 crop are reported, but a better feeling seems to prevail throughout the country. New York reports hops steady, and European advices tell of a lively tone prevailing in those markets.

Secretary James Winstanley, of the Oregon Hop Growers' Association was very busy in his office yesterday, but found time to give The Journal reporter an interesting interview.

Mr. Winstanley has heard from all the hop growers in Oregon, and some in Washington. From the reports received he estimates that not more than 19,000 bales remain unsold on this coast, and of these perhaps 4000 are sold for future delivery. He further estimates that 9350 bales of the 1900 crop remain in this state unsold.

If this be true, only about 16,000 bales remain on the coast to supply the brewers from now until October. If prices remain down England will buy from 5000 to 10,000 bales more, and the American brewers will take the rest. The American brewers are not well supplied, and every bale now in the market will be needed before the new crop is on the market.

Mr. Winstanley feels that the brewers are being misled by the statements circulated by the bears reporting 40,000 bales still on the market.

When asked about the outlook for the future crop, Mr. Winstanley replied that it was a little early to make any definite statement. He has found much brown rot, caused by cut worms, and many missing hills. He has reset these from a nursery made by burying hop roots in a sack, so that they would not sprout.

Otto Hansen, who is an extensive grower, owning two large yards in the vicinity of Salem, reports another pestilence in the form of a small worm, new to the hop grower of this section. Not much is known of the source or effect of this new trouble, but a specimen of the vermin has been sent to the state bacteriologist, Emile F. Perrot, at the Oregon Agricultural College, at Corvallis, and a report is expected in a few days.

All the growers are hoping for warmer weather, as the growth in the last two weeks has been very slow.

A Big Timber Deal.

W. H. Strobridge, the well known mining man of Glendale, this week bonded 42,000 acres of timber land in Jackson county, lying at the head of Rogue river and Butte creek, and will at once build 26 miles of railroad in order to reach the timber, and put in an enormous lumbering plant this season. Mr. Strobridge estimates that the timber will cut 1,200,000,000 feet of lumber, with 2,000,000,000 feet more tributary to it. The price agreed upon is \$25 per acre for 24,000 acres and \$20 for 18,000 acres. About 65 per cent of this timber is fir, 25 per cent sugar pine and 10 per cent yellow pine. Much of the ground will make fine agricultural and fruit land. Mr. Strobridge believes that about half of this railroad can be built at a cost not to exceed \$600 per mile.—Roseburg Review.

Landmark of Yamhill Destroyed.

A dispatch from LaFayette, under date of April 17th, says: The old "Essex House," which was one of the first hotels of any pretensions built in Oregon, burned to the ground last night. When the alarm was given the whole interior was a seething mass of flames, and the firemen could do nothing but try to save adjacent buildings. The house was occupied by Mrs. McDonald, a widow, whose household furniture was saved.
