MISS STONE TONIGHT

Story of Her Capture and Life Among the Brigands

A Wonderful Experience Told in an Entertaining Manner

Miss Stone emphasizes the fact that the kidnapping of herself and Mme. Talika was purely a political move, and in no sense a feat of private brigand enterprise. Though she endured constant hardship and exposure and was frankly told that she and her companion would be killed if captured by the Turks, and death at any time seemed imminent, she says she was treated with all the consideration possible under the circumstances. In spite of the fact that she was compelled to travel more than twelve hours a day, and was in constant expectation of death, Miss Stone's health remained unimpaired. She insists that the captors were actuated by patriotic motives, their one object being to raise money to buy arms for the Macedonian cause. It remains to be seen how much good the "patriots" will derive from the money obtained through the methods of the common highwayman. Apparently, the only good result of their act will be that of enabling Miss Stone to tell a romantic and unbacked narrative of "personally conducted" travel, in which the guide books will play no part. FIRST BERRIES ARRIVE

Salem Fruit Union Recognized

Crop Will go Into all the Northwestern Markets

Following is from the head of the commercial page of the Friday Portland Oregonian, and is very significant of the recognition that is given the Salem Fruit Grower's Union:

The first strawberries of the season arrived by express from California yesterday. They were received by the Pierson-Page company, and came in a pony refrigerator, containing 45 baskets. The berries were of the Longworth variety. They were of first-class quality, and sold at 25c. Strawberries will arrive daily from California up to the time that Oregon berries make their appearance. Next week shipments will be received from the famous Florin district.

All indications point to an immense crop of Oregon berries in view of the greatly improved acreage this year. The crop, however, may be late, owing to the backward spring. Up in Salem, the Fruit Growers' Union is meeting with success in getting the growers to sign contracts to deliver their crop to the Salem manager and the Portland distributing firm, which is only awaiting the completion of the contracts, when it will put its men on the road and get into all the Northwest markets with the Salem product. Says the Salem Statesman:

The success of these producers pools is now well established, and the Salem Fruit Growers' Union has undoubtedly a great future before it. It is stated that the mohair pool got 37 1/2 cents for its entire clip, while selling as individuals they would have averaged 27c to 30c a pound. Contracts for the signatures of the fruit growers are in the hands of A. Aufrans, Lloyd Reynolds, secretary of the union, and H. B. Thielsen, of the board of directors. All growers of strawberries, cherries and small fruits are urged to close up the lists and thus enable the work of preparing for distribution to the large markets to be pushed. Advices from McMinnville are as follows:

The strawberry crop in this part of the county will be very late, and it looks now as if the crop would be light. The cold weather and rains have kept the vines back. If the latter part of this month is warm, there may be a very good late crop. There are about 50 acres in the county scattered around McMinnville, Carlton, Amity and Newberg.

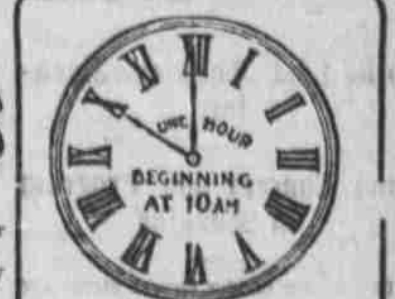
