## YEARS WITH HONOR A Celebrated Woman's Birthday

### Baroness Burdett-Coutts 90 Years Old Today.

## A Long Life Devoted to Practical Philanthropy

London, April 21.—Today the millionaire philanthropist, Baroness Burdett-Coutts entered her 90th year, having been born April 21, 1814. She has completely recovered from her serious illness of a year ago and there is no apparent reason why she should not live for a number of years yet, as she comes from a family noted for its longevity.

Sixty-five years devoted untiringly to the distribution of a vast fortune for the benefit of the poor—that is the remarkable record of this remarkable woman.

She began her active philanthropic work when she was but 23 years old. Her inheritance of nearly \$10,000,000 was bequeathed to her by her step-grandmother, the wife of Mr. Coutts the banker. One of the most active lieutenants of the Baroness, and quite her most important adviser, was no less a personage than Charles Dickens. The great novelist was familiar with every phase of life in London's squalid east end, and together they visited the wretched dens and planned wholesale reforms. One of the first things accomplished was to demolish a low den of thieves and murderers in Bethnal Green, and erect in its stead blocks of model dwellings—the Baroness was really the pioneer of the model dwellings in London—with every accommodation in the shape of laundry, baths, etc., and a good library and reading room.

When the weavers were absolutely starving for want of work, Lady Burdett-Coutts came forward as the principal supporter of an association which had been formed for the relief of the sufferers. Some of them were started in small businesses, younger ones were trained for useful employments, and a sewing school was also opened at which women of all ages were received.

It is now more than twenty years since the Baroness took for a helpmate the present Mr. Burdett-Coutts, who was William Ashmead Bartlett, American born, and who for some time had been her private secretary. She was then 67 and he 29, but in the intervening years he has aged relatively far more than she. He has \$200,000 a year settled on him.

## ESSAY ON SOUTH AMERICA

By a Pupil of the Salem Public Schools

Following essay by a pupil of the Sixth grade of the Lincoln school was written in the ordinary course of class work and is one of a number of excellent papers on the same subject:

South America is a great country a little southwest of North America. It is bounded on the north by the Caribbean sea and the Atlantic ocean, on the east by the Atlantic ocean, on the south by the Arctic ocean and Terra del Fuego, and on the west by the Pacific ocean.

The inhabitants of South America are chiefly of Spanish and Indian descent, although there are many mixed races. The religion is mostly catholic.

Farther south there are many diamonds in the beds of streams. Wheat is raised in great quantities in Brazil, and the countries farther south. Stock raising is quite a profitable business in Argentina.

The products are hides, gold, silver, diamonds, wheat, coffee, rubber, coconuts and many tropical fruits. The climate in the north is hot and dry in winter and wet in summer.

Most of the white people live in the temperate zones. There is a race of Indians who inhabit the south, known as the Alacaluques, they are a very savage race.

The chief seaports are Para, Buenos Ayres, Montevideo and Rio de Janeiro. Para is noted for the rubber it handles, Buenos Ayres for the wheat, hides, coffee and tropical fruits, Montevideo ships coffee and sugar cane, Rio de Janeiro is the chief port.

The nitrate desert is a very rich land. The nitrate is shipped to other countries and brings in millions of dollars yearly.

The mountains yield rich silver and gold mines. The rivers have good harbors, and South America will one day be a leading nation.

Naval Academy Examinations. Washington, April 21.—Examination of candidates for admission to the Naval Academy was commenced today. A second examination will be held in May, and a final examination in June. There are about 500 vacancies to be filled, Congress at the last session having largely increased the corps of cadets to meet the urgent demand for additional officers for the navy. The navy department is anxious that the largest number of cadets possible may be admitted to the academy this year, and to this end members of congress have been urged to designate candidates.
