**WHEN TEDDY COMES**

Committee Has All Arranged

Sub-committee Now Soliciting the Needed Funds

Visitors will be Here from all Parts of the State

The general committee on arrangements for the President's entertainment met in the police court room Monday afternoon, Geo. H. Burnett presiding. The reports of the many sub-committees were received and discussed, with many new features suggested.

The President's party will number 24. The President, Secretary Loeb, Assistant Secretary Barnes and Surgeon-General P. M. Rixey, U. S. N., besides stenographers, reporters and messengers.

It was thought best to have 25 footmen sworn in as police, to keep order at the train and during the exercises in Wilson Avenue. They will co-operate with the chief of police and sheriff.

There will be ten marshals of the day, mounted on white horses, if possible. The committee appointed the following as marshals: F. T. Wrightman, F. W. Durbin, Chas. Murphy, R. A. Crossan, John Estes, D. C. Minto, F. N. Derby, Fred Steusloff, W. M. Hunt and August Hucklestein.

The committee appointed by the last legislature to welcome the President will be invited, and as this is the state capital, no doubt will give its official welcome here.

The state officials, including the supreme court, will also be asked to take an active part in the greeting.

Jean Francois Mathieu, the oldest pioneer in the county, who was present at the organization of the territorial government of Oregon, at Champoeg, will be an honored guest of the occasion.

The instructions sent to Mayor Bishop by Secretary Loeb outline a general plan, which must be followed. The instructions state that at no time must the Presidential party be separated and it will be necessary to build a rostrum in Wilson avenue that will accommodate the entire party.

The arrangements, as planned by the committee, will require some money. Hal Patton and D. J. Fry worked an hour Monday on this matter and will be assisted by Paul Sroat and J. H. Graham.

In raising the funds needed it will be asking too much if a few men are to do it all, and each citizen should contribute something, so that he might feel that it was in fact, as much his welcome as any one else's.

**Spring is Backward**

Washington, April 21.—The weekly crop report shows some regarding features. Spring wheat, particularly in Minnesota, is slow of germination, also in Iowa and South Dakota. It says farming operations in the Central and West Gulf states, and a portion of the southeastern Rocky Mountain slopes need rain. Very slow progress is being made in corn planting in the corn belt, owing to cold, wet weather. It says plenty of irrigation water is insured for Southern California, owing to rain. Frosts have done injury to some crops in Oregon.

**Companies Raise Wages**

Clarksburg, W. Va., April 21.—The Fairmount Coal Company and Clarkburg Fuel Company and the independent operators of this district have advanced the wages of miners 2 1/2 cents per ton, laborers, 10 cents a day. This is the second voluntary raise since January 1st, and makes the highest wages paid since the Civil War.

**Lockout Situation**

New York, April 21.—A special sitting of the interstate commerce commission is being held today to investigate the charges that the coal carrying roads have violated the law. A large array of counsel are representing the several roads. Charges are made by Hearst that a combination exists governing the amount of production and freight charges and the price of coal at tidewater.

Butte, April 21.—The pupils of the public schools threaten to strike unless their demand that the schools be dismissed at 3 instead of 4 o'clock be granted.
