BEST WAY TO TANANA

Twenty Day Trip Only by Way of Valdez

Best Time to Start is About the Last of May

(Valdez News.)

What are the conditions of the Valdez route—the only safe and reliable one to the Tanana. The season is too far advanced, it is true, for people to come from the states and attempt to sled in overland with horses, but those already here and those who will arrive during the next ten days will have plenty of time. But for those who desire to go in light with dogs this is the shortest, quickest and easiest and most desirable route to take from every point of view. The trail is in excellent condition, the country is practically level, and the trip can be made in eighteen to twenty days.

But the man who leaves Valdez about the 25th of May with pack horses will reach the diggings twenty or thirty days ahead of those who arrive on the first boats. And not only will he be sure of getting there, but the trip can be made in very much less time and at very much less expense. He may pack 250 pounds on a horse and make an average of 20 miles a day and make a pleasure trip of it. This will bring him to the diggings in twenty days from Valdez, whereas if he goes by either of the other routes he will be anywhere from thirty to forty days making the trip, and perhaps longer, depending upon the state of the water in the Tanana.

He passes through a country which furnishes an abundance of forage for his horses, a country which abounds in wild game, both large and small, a country the streams of which teem with fish, and if he desires, the stamper may take an outfit only a rifle, a pound of salt and a few pounds of powder—he will not only make the trip all right, but will fare sumptuously all the way. He evades the danger of hanging up on a sandbar and losing his outfit, his summer's work or his life, and if for any reason he should change his mind and not desire to go to the Tanana, he is in a country with limitless mineral possibilities, and he will certainly not waste his time by stopping and prospecting. All things considered the overland route from Valdez is unquestionably the best of the three to the Tanana, and as soon as this fact becomes known, this trail will be lined with people going in and out. Of course, in the fall almost the entire travel to the outside will come by way of Valdez. Navigation will close before the season does, and those desiring to come out will have no alternative but to come by way of Valdez unless they desire to mush to Dawson, which is not at all likely.

Troops to Escort Governor Odell. Albany, N. Y., April 27.—Arrangements have been perfected by Adj. Gen. Henry for the escort of 1000 National Guardsmen which will accompany Governor Odell to St. Louis to participate in the exercises attending the dedication of the buildings of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. Governor Odell and the members of his staff will leave this city on a special train at midnight tonight, and will arrive at St. Louis Wednesday morning. The escort will comprise 150 cavalrymen, a division of 70 naval militiamen and of representatives from various infantry organizations throughout the state. Col. Samuel M. Kelsch of Buffalo, the senior Colonel in the Guard, has been designated to command the escort.
