The central figure is a Wooltex costume with its new effect, stole front and triple tulle skirt. The petticoat for this costume is a Sorosis demyoke, mercerized silk appearing fabric.

The bolero costume with the triple yoke for the skirt is made of Mohair. Silhouette of the richest and heaviest character. The particular vogue of Mohair silhouette is accounted for in the fact that the great English dyers of Bradford are making higher and newer finishes than ever before in history.

This costume shows the new low-necked effect, or rather the collarless dress, and it will be noted that the front is trimmed in triplets of pearl buttons. The swinging low front is the new French curve which is particularly emphasized by the assistance of a new and welcome article of woman's apparel known as the Rosalind waist adjuster.

This splendid contrivance is attached to the corset which holds it comfortably and rigidly at the desired point. The belts of the skirt, underskirt, and waist are most easily and neatly arranged by the use of this new article. They are kept firmly yet easily in place without a wrinkle, dispensing with much of the annoying fullness to the superposing of several different garments.

The third costume is of the spring weight Worrail dyed English velveteen. It has also the French curve front, and in addition has the new extended skirt back which is produced by a single strip of featherbone descending from the waist line in back to a point about 12 inches above the bottom of the skirt where a fork or triple line of featherbone holds the rear of the skirt gently but gracefully in place.
