

SOCIALISTS HAVE THEIR FIRST RALLY

**Spell Binder Wilkens
Manages to Get
a Crowd**

**Rakes Everything From
President Roosevelt Down
to Constable**

The Socialist party opened its campaign at the city hall Tuesday evening with a three-headed performance by Orators Wilkins, of California; Quinn, of Portland, and Candidate for Congress Engle, from Corvallis. There was a good deal of enthusiasm, and the chairman of Marion county, R. R. Ryan, was in his glory.

With the tramp, tramp of marching soldiers, the ringing commands of officers, and the metallic ring of the steel over his head, M. W. Wilkins, national organizer of the Socialist party, spoke to a fair-sized audience in the city hall last night. Mr. Wilkins is a typical spell-binder, and his word pictures of the condition of the wage-earner were worked out with a close attention to the details of poverty, prostitution and crime.

Mr. Wilkins believes that the wage-earner of today is a slave, and that the economic struggle is a class struggle, with wealth arranged on one side and the wage-earner on the other. He is an earnest talker, and makes one think that he believes what he says.

State Lands.

The state school lands are going rapidly, and yesterday was a banner day in handling them. Most of the purchasers are buying land without knowing anything about it, and it is quite possible some of them will revert to the state and be sold again. Over 10,000 acres were turned over to private people yesterday, the price being \$1.25 per acre, and the first payment is 25 cents. The present rush for lands will continue until May 20th, at which time the price is doubled, and purchasers will want positive information concerning the lands before bidding for them.

will start for the exposition grounds, preceded by the president and invited guests in carriages. At the grounds a presidential salute of twenty-one guns will be fired.

The doors of the Liberal Arts Building will be opened and a band concert will be given. At 2 o'clock the ceremonies will begin. They will consist of an invocation by Cardinal Gibbons and addresses by the exposition officials. President Roosevelt will make an address, and after a grand chorus former president Cleveland will speak.

On Friday the members of the diplomatic corps, the representatives of foreign governments to the exposition and other official guests will be taken by a military escort to the grounds. Addresses will be made by the French Ambassador and the Spanish Minister. The civic parade will take place Saturday and will be reviewed by the governors of the various states. In the course of the ceremonies at the Liberal Arts Building addresses will be made by Governors Odell of New York and Dockery of Missouri. At the close of the ceremonies on each of the three days a centennial salute of 100 guns will be fired. A display of fireworks will be made each evening.

SHIELD'S PARK CONTRACT

**Has Been Let to Albert
Southwick**

**Salem Summer Palace of
Amusement Projected**

Cooke Patton and Albert Southwick, who have the contract for erecting the pavilion for the Shield's park summer theater, went over the ground today, and work will begin on the structure tomorrow.

The dimensions of the enclosure will be 80x120, with entrances on Commercial and Center streets. The management and entertainments will be on a circuit of ten similar parks and summer theaters in the principal cities of the Northwest, the companies playing the best towns in the four states, and the plan is to have daily entertainments every night during the season.

The grounds will be enclosed with a tight high board enclosure, with elevated ten-cent circus seats on the back and two sides, and better seats with backs in the main auditorium, which will have a sloping floor to the 30-foot stage in front, capable of seating 1500 people.

The whole will be elaborately lighted with electricity, and have the cool, starlit heavens overhead. Altogether it promises to be a popular place of public amusement that will be an added attraction to life in the Capital City.

City Wells Infected.

After the analysis of water of several wells Health Officer Paine declares them the nidus of typhoid germ infection. Especially is this so of the well on Gaiety Mathews' premises, 71 West Ninth street, and the doctor has ordered that the well be abandoned.

Four cases of typhoid alone have resulted from the use of water of the Mathews well—Messrs. G. Danson, Wade Bailey and Miss Lila Mitchell, all of whom are convalescing from severe cases of the disease. Miss Agnes Mathews has just recently been stricken with the malady.—Eugene Register.

Two Portland Pardons.

Governor Chamberlain today signed pardons for Robert Richardson and Robert Gerald, both sentenced from Multnomah county. Richardson was sent up for burglary, and has served half his term. He is very young, and this being his first offense the gov-

ernor will give him a chance to do better.

Gerald was sentenced for having morphine in his possession. He is also very young, and because he was a member of the Second Oregon regiment and saw service during the late war, he will be given another chance.

Glassware.

An authority says that glassware will last longer and look better if the following hints as to its care and preservation are regarded: Tepid water, the best custard or other pure soap and a stiff brush are the first essentials. After washing and rinsing place the cut glass in boxwood sawdust. This will absorb the moisture in the cutting. Next remove the sawdust from the plain surfaces with a soft cloth. By following these directions the original clearness and sparkle of the glass will be maintained.

A Window Seat.

An acceptable window seat which most girls crave for their rooms starts with one of the low rattan seats without backs that may be bought at any shop offering an assortment of this ware. They come in different lengths, so that a little care in selection secures one to fit almost any window space. They may be left the natural color, or, preferably, stained to match the finish of the woodwork of the room. A loose cushion adds to their comfort, and a valance may be used if liked.

Bacon Grease.

Bacon grease, by the way, should never be thrown away, as it is useful in a variety of ways. Cabbage chopped very fine and boiled until tender is good seasoned with hot bacon grease poured over it after it has been put in a deep dish. Slices of bacon may be used to garnish this homely, but excellent, dish.

BERRY PEST FOUND

**Eating the Foliage of Straw-
berries**

**Good Prospect for Crop of
Cherries and Berties**

There is an excellent prospect for a large berry and cherry crop. Strawberries are coming into bloom very nicely, and on some of the earlier varieties fruit as large as young gooseberries can be found.

Cherry trees are beginning to shed their blooms and the little cherries have set and are getting a firm hold on the trees. The frosts and cold, dashing rains have been minus quantities, and never has a spring advanced so gradually and securely into a more splendid promise.

The Journal editor has located a new strawberry pest that is destroying the foliage in some of the fields. The bug resembles the Colorado potato beetle, but is brown to black, and has the trick of falling off the leaf and quickly disappearing into the soil, which it resembles in color. Samples have been sent to the agricultural college for identification. No great injury has been wrought so far. They can be destroyed by a light sprinkling of slacked lime under the foliage.

Killed

By a Bull but

Corvallis, Or., April 29.—The unexpected attack of a Jersey bull so injured William Armstrong, a farmer, that he died at 6:30 Tuesday night, two hours after the trouble. The bull was hornless, and the injuries to Armstrong were mainly inflicted while the animal stood over the man's prostrate body, and persisted in the attack with repeated butts from his hornless head.

Armstrong was 68 years of age, and resided four miles south of Philomath, in the vicinity of Oak Ridge. He was leading the animal from the pasture to the barn for the night. There was a ring in the bull's nose, and to this a short chain was attached. The old man held to the end of the chain as he led the way to the barn. No one saw the attack begin, but a partial account, feebly given by Armstrong, after his rescue, is that

he stooped over on some animal it was then that the animal attacked. It was totally unexpected, and strong was knocked prostrate, a loud bellowing that attracted attention of Neighbor Henderson, a mile away, the bull kept its attack. The 12-year-old grand turning from school, and in the house but 100 or 200 away, heard the bellowing, seized a club and attacked, but the animal refused to be away.

Then Armstrong called to bring the shotgun from the house. A charge of shot from the sent by Armstrong's gun drove the bull's nose drove away. Neighbors soon saw the maimed victim was in the house. His chest was crushed in.

The deceased had resided 30 years in Benton county, his wife resided with Mrs. Ersox, their daughter. The remains of the funeral were held at John Armstrong, who is from Wallace, Idaho.

Died Together.

Cyrus Bacon, aged 80 years, wife, 70 years, died at 7:00 Tuesday night, the latter an hour before her husband. They from Illinois to Washington where they had since resided. Children survive them.
