

ANOTHER FOREST RESERVE

Part in Oregon, Part
in California

Oregon Loses 1,405,440
Acres, Thus Withdrawn

The Foundation Being Laid
for Stupendous Frauds

Officials of the United States land office in Roseburg were advised by wire Wednesday that a new government forest reserve had been created in Southwestern Oregon, and that all lands included within the boundaries specified are withdrawn from settlement or entry after this date. The tract thus withdrawn includes the following townships, lying mostly in Josephine and Curry counties, and extending from the southern portion of Douglas and Coos counties to the state boundary line. The new reserve also extends into California, but the area included in that state has not yet been made known here.

The total area of the new reserve in Oregon is 61 townships, or 1,405,440 acres. The withdrawal of this large area does not affect the title of settlers now residing therein on claims heretofore regularly filed in the United States land office, or other regular filings of proofs heretofore made.

More Ceremonies at St. Louis.

St. Louis, Mo., May 1.—The second day of the dedicatory program of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition was given over to the foreign representatives, and though the exercises appealed to the general public less than the brilliant pageantry of yesterday, they were none the less interesting. At 10 o'clock this morning the members of the diplomatic corps, the foreign representatives and other official guests assembled at the St. Louis Club and were conducted thence under military escort to the Liberal Arts building, where the exercises of the day were held.

Former Senator John M. Thurston, of the national commission, was in charge of the exercises, and delivered a brief introductory address. President Francis, of the exposition, followed with an address of welcome to the foreign representatives, for whom response was made by M. Jussierand, the French ambassador at Washington. There was also a formal address by the Spanish minister, and brief remarks by several of the other diplomats. The speeches were interspersed with musical selections, and at the close of the program there was a centennial salute of 100 guns.

Program of German Agriculturists.
New York, May 1.—Forty-six German agriculturists will arrive in New York tomorrow. They will cross the continent and make a trip of 10,000 miles to study methods of farming and stock raising. Among them will be feudal land barons, scientists in the government service and students of agriculture.

J. L. Schultz, of the United States department of agriculture is here to meet the visitors, and two special cars are ready to take them on their long tour. They will travel by a southern route to California, up the Pacific coast, and return to the Atlantic through the northern tier of states. The trip has been arranged to enable the visitors to inspect the great wheat regions of the West, the orchards of the North, the stock farms of the South and West, and the packing houses of Kansas City and Chicago. The tour will occupy nearly two months.

President at Kansas City.

Kansas City, May 1.—President Roosevelt arrived in Kansas City from St. Louis early this morning, and received an ovation similar to the rousing welcomes that have been accorded him everywhere on his present trip. Despite his iron constitution, the President was very slightly inclined to have that tired feeling after the busy time at St. Louis yesterday, but, as he remarked, the enthusiastic demonstration upon his arrival here was enough to make any one forget fatigue. The program of the forenoon comprised an informal reception of prominent citizens, a luncheon at the Baltimore Hotel, under the auspices of the Commercial Club, and then a parade to Kansas City Kan., where two hours were spent prior to the departure for Topeka at 4 o'clock this afternoon. The President's escort included regulars and state militia. West streets, Broadway, Bluff street and other thoroughfares, through which the parade passed, were elaborately decorated, and the wide walks

along the line were crowded with cheering spectators. At the state line the distinguished visitor was handed over to the Kansas officials, and there was a parade similar to that held on this side of the river. The departure from Kansas City, Kan., was made from the Armourdale station, where an enthusiastic multitude assembled to give a farewell cheer.

Program at Topeka.

Topeka, Kan., May 1.—President Roosevelt is scheduled to reach Topeka at 6 o'clock this evening, and will remain in the city 12 hours. During that time he will make two addresses, the principal one at the Auditorium this evening, at the International convention of the Young Men's Christian Association.

The Topeka city troop will meet the President at the Santa Fe depot. Between two lines of the mounted troops the President will cross the street from the depot to the new Y. M. C. A. building, where he will officiate at the laying of the corner stone, and deliver a brief address. A dinner at the executive mansion will follow.

Snags are Numerous

There is now considerable need of some work on both the North and South fork of Coos river, in the way of cleaning the channel of a large number of snags, which have gradually drifted in.

Captain Edwards says that if he had the snag boat at his disposal he could rid the stream of about all the dangerous snags, and could make the river safe for the Alert through the entire season.

There is money which has been appropriated for two years for the purpose, and has not been used. To get the money, already appropriated, applied to the purpose for which it was set aside will require some action by the board of engineers, and it is suggested that the Chamber of Commerce make a request that the snag boat be put in operation as soon as possible.

May and June are the best months for this work. The principle work on North Fork would be between Tom Blain's and Allegany.

The channel on the South Fork has been receiving many recruits in the way of snags, which are a hindrance to navigation and a menace to safety, especially after dark. It is to be hoped that the available amount of funds, at least, will be used up in getting out some of these dangerous snags."—Coast Mail.

Englishmen Take a Walk

London, May 1.—The most notable May day sport today was a walking match between 57 young members of the stock exchange, the course being 53 miles to Brighton. They started at 6:30, accompanied by a large procession of motor cars and other vehicles. One automobile carried well-known book makers dressed as chimney sweeps, who were taking bets on route. An intermittent rain gave pedestrians a woe-begone appearance. At 10 o'clock George Nichols is leading by eight minutes. He is at Eodhill and looks like the probable winner. At the distance of 15 miles 53 others are bunched behind, and 23 have dropped out.

Henry Broad won the walking match in nine hours and 53 minutes, beating all amateur records for the same distance, and almost equalling the world's professional record.

Spanish Politics

Madrid, May 1.—There was a political riot at Infesto last night, because of a proclamation that the ministerial candidates had been elected to parliament, even though the Liberals had a majority of the votes. The Liberals charged the officials, who, in self-defense, ordered the gendarmes to fire. Thirteen Liberals were killed and many seriously wounded.

Labor Day Celebrated

Berlin, May 1.—Labor day was celebrated by hundreds of thousands of Social Democrats throughout Germany. Fifty-two meetings were held at various places this morning, and 16 great popular fests this afternoon.

STRIKES SIMMER SLOWLY

Socialists Stop Work
at Rome

Four Thousand Truck Drivers
at New York go Out

Boston has a Job Lot, and
Chicago is Unwashed

Chicago, May 1.—The only two strikes of importance are at the Deering Harvester Works and several thousand laundry employees, the latter going out this morning, to enforce their demand for a ten per cent increase. All the big laundries are tied up. The harvester strike promises to be settled by arbitration. Outside of these two, barely 1000 persons are out in petty disputes.

The number of laundrymen now out is 3500. The entire city is now dependent on Chinese and a few hand laundries for clean linen. It is estimated that there are over 5,000,000 pieces of laundry in the bins and tubs at the closed plants.

Six thousand strikers now surround the Deering Harvester Works, but show no violence. A guard of 500 policemen is being kept in readiness to suppress rioting.

New York, May 1.—Four thousand truck drivers have struck for an increase of pay and a 10-hour day. The threatened strike in the ship yards was averted by settlement this morning.

Rome, May 1.—The Socialists issued a request that all workmen celebrate May day by stopping work, and as a result 10,000 police and military are being held in readiness to crush any demonstration.

Boston, May 1.—About 2100 men struck in Boston and vicinity today, including lathers, asphalters, structural iron men, hoisting engineers, bakers and carpenters. The boiler makers and shipbuilders reached an agreement, thus avoiding a walk-out.

Spokane, May 1.—The mill workers, lumber workers, building laborers, iron moulders and stable men, a total of 500 men, went out on strike this morning for shorter hours or increased wages. It will involve the carpenters and tie up building. The breweries acceded to the men's demands.

Norfolk, Va., May 1.—A general carpenters' strike at Newport News began today. All the affiliated trades are affected.

Omaha, May 1.—Two thousand struck this morning, teamsters, waiters and cooks. Only three restaurants are open, and practically there is no hauling. The strikers demand increase of wages and union recognition.

Glasgow, May 1.—The engineers' strike this morning is practically complete. Everything is at a standstill.

Los Angeles, May 1.—The structural iron workers, who returned to work a few days ago, again struck this morning. They say the contractors are not living up to the eight-hour agreement.

Philadelphia, May 1.—Six thousand carpenters struck today for an increase of wages.

Big Summer Resort Fire

Richmond, May 1.—A fire nearly swept away the West Point summer resort this morning. Many are homeless, and the financial loss is \$125,000.
