Minnesota Flour in Oregon.

Both Jackson and Klamath counties are short of wheat now. Klamath county, which grows about the finest hard wheat in the whole West, is being supplied with some consignments of flour from the outside. Minneapolis flour is being sold in Ashland, for the first time in the town's history. Flour from the Willamette valley is being sold here also, as has been done frequently in former years. Some farmers allege that the existence of a flour mill trust in this valley has discouraged wheat growing more than the larger profits which was to be expected from fruit raising. For several years the people of this section have been buying Eastern bacon and hams heavily. Pails, baskets and a hundred other things are shipped here that ought to be manufactured at home.—Ashland Tribune.

Drug Store Removal.

Fred A. Legg, the popular Salem druggist, who has been in business at the old Red Front corner for 13 years, has decided to move into the corner room, two doors south of where he is at present.

His large stock will be moved Monday, and will receive substantial additions in the near future, and the Steiner Drug Co. will sustain its old-time reputation of being the leading retail drug house of the city. Campbell & Hewitt have the contract for remodeling the front.

Away for the Day.

The pupils of Miss Anna Gordon's room, North Salem, public schools, have abandoned their school room, and will spend the day in the woods. Promptly at 8 o'clock this morning they gathered at the school house, and soon after a wagon with a large hay-rack arrived on the scene to carry them away to the Asylum farm picnic grounds. SALEM BRICK SUPPLY

Short Because of Unusual Demand

Caused by Fires and Material for Public Buildings

Several times The Journal has mentioned the fact that it was difficult at times to get brick in Salem for building purposes, and while this has been a fact, still it was hardly the fault of the brick yard. Mr. A. A. Burton, who conducts the largest brick making plant in the city, informed a Journal reporter yesterday that the scarcity of brick was caused by the great demand made by the fires at the smaller towns near Salem. Mr. Burton made enough brick to last this season, but, of course, he did not look into the future, and so made no allowances for the outside demand. He is now burning another kiln, and it is safe to say that Salem will have more brick than can be used from now on.

Another Yard Needed.

Some of the building contractors are of the opinion that another yard is badly needed at Salem. At present builders are trying to get rates on shipments of brick to Eugene and other points, and if there were a special demand for large lots, there is no doubt the railroad company would make such rates that brick could be shipped from here to all parts of the state. The Salem brick have a reputation for quality second to none in the state, and Burton Bros. have done much to establish this good name for Salem brick.

Couldn't Raise That Child.

Judge Pritchard, of North Carolina, tells how healthy his state is, and gives the following instance to prove it: A mountaineer aged 92, and his wife, aged 90, were returning from the funeral of their oldest child, who had died at the age of 71. They were both deeply grieved. As they were discussing their loss, the wife said: "I always told you, Jim, that we would never raise that child.—Buffalo Commercial.

The Alberta Mine Horror

Frank, Alberta, May 1.—The minds of the people of Frank, what remains of them, are blank in consequence of the awful disaster of yesterday morning, when a great portion of Turtle mountain slid across the valley of Crow's Nest Pass, bringing death to 63, for the total has now grown to that number, of residents of the community, and doing damage so great that it cannot yet all be told.

Throughout yesterday and at intervals during the night and today, the slide continued, with the result that Frank has been depopulated. Many residents went to Blairmore, a village two miles distant, where they obtained shelter, while many more left the country altogether, going to distant points. Few of these are expected to return. Those who remained were principally persons in business, who could ill afford to desert their interests, or were possessed of that spirit which prompts men to remain where life is in danger for the sake of their fellowmen or to do the work which must be done in the interest of relatives of those who have been sacrificed. But two residences in the town were occupied last night, but they by people not their owners, but who were of the stuff which does not desert so long as a duty remains to be done. Hotels out of the range of danger were filled, but all others had fled.

Today the scene has been one of desolation, hard to be realized except by comparison to the recent volcanic eruptions in the West Indies, though on a much smaller scale. Those who have not taken the precaution to preserve their epidermis, by placing distance between themselves and harm, continued the search for the victims of the disaster, but with poor results. But two more bodies have thus far been recovered. One was that of P. Farrington, a miner. The other was mangled beyond recognition. This makes the total number of bodies recovered nine. One more body was today identified as that of Francois Rochette, a laborer in the employ of the coal company. But one of the bodies recovered remains unidentified. The dismembered portion of one body has been found, but the rest of the body cannot be found.

JACK JEFFRY DECLINES

Will Not Debate With Socialists

Ryan Had no Authority to Arrange for It

There is no joint debate coming off Saturday night, as had been announced, between the Socialist orator, Wilkins, and the local Democrat, John Jeffery.

The latter claims there was no consultation with him, and the fact is Jeffery is something of a politician himself, and can see no good coming from an arraignment of the principles of Jefferson and the teachings of modern Socialism.

When asked if he would debate today he softly waved off the reporter with a cautious flow of words like these:

"I cannot understand why Chairman Ryan should have made the statement to The Journal that I would debate with Mr. Wilkins. He must have known that no such agreement had been made, and that I have sought no wordy contest with any member of his party. I never refuse a public discussion, when I consider that any good can be done thereby, but fall to see such opportunity in meeting a Socialist in debate upon party policies. If the gentleman used my name for the purpose of causing me to appear in an awkward position, or to draw a larger crowd than he otherwise would have, he has failed in both objects, since I shall not appear at all in the first instance, and in the second my presence would not have produced the desired effect."

Supreme Court Opinions.

The supreme court today handed down three decisions, and denied the petition for a rehearing in the case of the State of Oregon, appellant, vs. Geo. W. Davis, E. P. McCormack and Geo. G. Bingham, respondents. In denying this petition Justice Brandeis said: "The case was tried and decided on an agreed statement of facts, from which it appears, as all parties assumed and represented at the hearing, that the defalcation of Davis was committed prior to January 1, 1895. The attorney general has filed a petition for a rehearing in which he argues that the stipulation does not necessarily so state. But the construction given it by his predecessor in office, who made and signed it, is in accordance with the plain intent and meaning, and must prevail. It was admitted and stipulated as a fact by the state for the purpose of the trial that the defalcation occurred more than six years before the commencement of the action, and such stipulation is as binding upon the state as it would be upon a private individual."

The following are the decisions: Mollie Wolf, administratrix of the estate of Isaac Wolf, deceased, respondent, vs. the City & Suburban Railway Company, appellant; from Multnomah county; J. B. Cleland, judge; reversed and remanded. Opinion by Justice Brandeis.

Alice M. Tomastul, appellant, vs. M. M. Taylor and Geo. E. Quiggle, respondents; from Multnomah county; Arthur L. Frazier, judge; affirmed. Opinion by Justice Brandeis.

George Schlegler, administrator of the estate of Fred Schlegler, deceased, respondent, vs. The Northern Pacific Terminal Company, appellant; from Multnomah county; Arthur L. Frazier, judge; affirmed. Opinion by Justice Wolverton.
