Holds First Rally of the Season Tuesday Night

Good Crowd and Enthusiasm for Republican Principal and Binger Hermann was Great

There was a fine audience at the city hall Tuesday night, although the absence of music indicated that there is as yet no campaign fund in the hands of the managers of this special election. A few little handbills and the newspaper notices, however, drew out a better crowd than anyone expected.

A number of ladies were present, and the hits of the evening by such well-known local speakers as T. H. Ford, Jos. Lee, Frank Davey and E. H. Flagg were taken up and roundly applauded. A large part of the audience was composed of laboring men, and they seemed to catch onto the fact that politics had something to interest the wage-earner this year more than ordinarily.

Many of the old Republican war-horses were present, and some of the speakers paid their respects to Mr. Reames and exploited Binger Hermann's ability to get anything in the way of appropriations that he ever went after, when he was in congress before, and he would do so again. The meeting lasted until nearly 10 o'clock, and there was the closest attention to all that was said. Arrangements are being made to push the campaign all over the county, and from this time on their will be lots of politics.

The national committee will send Congressman McClaren, of Minnesota, to campaign Oregon for Hermann.

Hon. Frank Davey has been invited to make speeches in Coos and Curry counties.

Memorial Day Celebration

It was the sense of the committee that the G. A. R. should go to the cemetery in a body, and there to decorate the graves and perform the ceremonies in accordance with the G. A. R. ritual.

Captain to Be Tried

Albany military circles had a sensation sprung on them yesterday, when it became known that Captain Frank C. Stellmacher, of Company G, O. N. G., of this city, had been ordered court-martialed by the military authorities. The charges have not been made public, but, from what can be gathered, grew out of remarks said to have been made by Captain Stellmacher concerning Major M. H. Ellis, also of this city. An inspection of Company G was conducted some time ago by Major Ellis, who is regimental surgeon, and the remarks are said to have been made that night. Charges were prepared and filed, and Captain Stellmacher was asked by the military board to resign or stand trial. He chose the latter course, and the court-martial has been ordered. The date will be announced in a day or so. Pending the trial, Lieutenant Wallace will probably have charge of the com-

pany. A number of witnesses have been subpoenaed on both sides, and the hearing will be rather on the sensational order.

Captain Frank C. Stellmacher has been a member of the Oregon National Guard for over 10 years, and served with the Second Oregon Volunteers in the Philippines. He was appointed second lieutenant in the regular army in August, 1891, but failed on account of a defect in his eyes. He was elected captain of Company G about 18 months ago and is rated as a good drill-master. He is at present deputy county clerk.

Major M. H. Ellis is also a national guard member of years standing and served with the Oregon regiment in the Philippines, where he was brigade surgeon. He is a thorough disciplinarian, and is prominent in local affairs.—Albany Herald.

Sunday Baseball

Those who are opposed to the Willamette Valley Baseball League playing games on Sunday, have filed a complaint against the directors, who are Al. Hampton, W. H. Kay, L. H. Traver, Cal. M. Young and Otho Roberts, also the secretary, W. F. Gilstrap, Treasurer D. E. Yoran and Manager James Griffin. The papers will be served this morning.

The baseball directors held a meeting last evening, and employed attorneys to represent their side of the case. They claim that baseball does not come under the purview of the Sunday closing law for places of amusements. The case will be watched with interest.—Eugene Register.

Penitentiary Conveniences.
Among the many improvements proposed for the penitentiary is a watchman's detector and a private telephone system connecting the different posts with the central office. Governor Chamberlain is now getting bids on these, and it has been decided to have both the detector and telephone system installed at once.

The detector is an electric register, so arranged that each hour a guard, on duty, must register. This makes it impossible for him to leave his post or sleep.

Convict Pardoned.
Governor Chamberlain today pardoned Joseph Strollberg, a convict sentenced from Josephine county in September, 1900, for assault with a dangerous weapon. There is some doubt as to Strollberg's sanity. The pardon was recommended by the judge who sentenced him, and the district attorney who handled the case against him.

The Greater Salem Commercial Club meets tonight, and will hear a report on the condition of the Salem water front. The Denver capitalist, Joseph J. Houry, the new owner of the Salem Light, Power & Traction Company, will be present and make some statements of interest to the citizens and business men. There should be a big attendance.

Salem, Or., May 5, 1903.
To the Hon. Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen: We, your committee to whom was referred the matter of the petition of A. B. Kurtz for an electric light franchise in and for the city of Salem, beg leave to report as follows:

We recommend that the said A. B. Kurtz be granted a franchise as prayed for on the following terms and conditions:

That it be for a period of 15 years. That said A. B. Kurtz, or his assigns, pay two per cent per annum upon the gross earnings of said franchise and business during the life of said grant.

That the said A. B. Kurtz, or his assigns, furnish the said city of Salem a good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$5000, secured by some standard surety company, for the proper installation of his proposed plant and business under said franchise, on or before the expiration of one year.

That the franchise proposed to be granted to the said A. B. Kurtz shall not be assigned, transferred, sold or hypothecated, at any time, to any person, firm, company or corporation (save and except to the Union Light & Power Company, which he now claims to represent,) without the express consent of the common council of the said city of Salem, Oregon.
