DISCLOSURES MADE

BY GENERAL MILES.

The report of General Miles regarding his personal observations in the Philippines, though presented to the war department in February last, has just been given to the public.

There is always much official reluctance at Washington to let the people know anything unsatisfactory regarding conditions in the Philippines.

When a civilian writes accusing officers or privates in the United States army of cruelties or inhumanities in the Philippines, a chorus of indignation arises from the imperialists who swiftly convict the accuser of an unpatriotic intention to "smirch" the fair fame of the American army. But no one will have the hardihood to say that the commanding general of the army, in the report above mentioned, was actuated by bad motives in relating numerous instances of torture and atrocities brought to his attention in the islands.

The first part of the report of General Miles indicates that the climate of the Philippines is decidedly bad for white men. He says troops which go there in the best of health and the prime of manhood are seriously affected by two or three years' service; that very few escape bad consequences, and the majority are debilitated. In November last he found 17,574 troops on duty and 1515 sick. This army of occupation was scattered through 122 stations, nearly all of them remote, so that the service, he says, is depressing and demoralizing.

Of the Filipinos themselves General Miles says: "I do not think there is today a people so sorely afflicted." He found the country devastated by war, crops destroyed by locusts, and that pestilence had caused probably as many as 150,000 deaths, with prospects of famine to further add to the miseries of the inhabitants.

The general specifies numerous cases of torture by command of American officers, whose names he mentions, giving his authority for the statements made. In one instance fifteen inoffensive persons in a village had been subjected to the torture known as the "water cure." One of them, an old and highly respected citizen, had been fatally burned in his house, which had been set on fire while he was lying unconscious from the effects of the torture.

In another instance 600 people had been confined in a small building. The general says he has no reason to disbelieve these statements; in fact, the case of the man tortured and burned to death had been confirmed. He saw and talked with a number of men who had been victims of the "water cure."

We need not repeat here the various other instances of atrocities related by General Miles, as his report has been printed. And, while he expressly exonerates a number of the American generals in the Philippines, he was given to understand that certain other commanding officers in the islands had connived at the cruel treatment of natives. Lieutenant Gault, who had first tortured three priests and afterwards taken them out to be shot, was court-martialed, escaping with a trivial sentence.

Among the examples of misconduct related by the general is that of compelling people in reconcentration camps, virtually prisoners of war, to buy food through military channels at a large advance on first cost.

The many detailed statements of like character in the report go far to show that military service in the Philippines has been brutalizing in the extreme. However great the provocations may have been, there can be no excuse for torture or other atrocities on the part of American officers or men.

In a letter addressed to the secretary of war, Judge Advocate General Davis says the charges of atrocities mentioned by General Miles are under investigation, and dwells upon the difficulties of arriving at the truth. The probability is that none of the offenders will ever be brought to justice, or made to suffer even a reprimand. It appears to be the disposition of the army officers in the islands to shield their fellows who are charged with mistreatment of Filipinos. This may be due to the fact that some of the more savage of the natives have cruelly ill-used American prisoners, but it is none the less deplorable and indefensible.

In pursuance of the policy of "holding the Philippines" this country has poured out many millions of dollars, is still under an enormous expense, has sacrificed and continues to sacrifice the lives of thousands of its troops, and is demoralizing its army. Where is the profit?

The American trade with the islands, of which so much was expected, is insignificant, save that which results from the military occupation involving a heavy loss.

Financially and morally, this nation would be in all respects better off had Dewey sailed away and left the is-
