## ENGLAND'S LIQUOR BILL.

England has a pretty stiff drink bill statistics just published showing that in 1902 it amounted to \$859,000,000, an average of about \$25 for each man, woman and child of the population.

The distillers, brewers and saloon keepers wield enormous political power, and all efforts to interfere with the liquor traffic legislatively, fails. The heads of all the great brewing firms, because of enormous contributions to the tory campaign funds, have been elevated to the peerage, and as members of the house of lords vote against all radical temperance legislation.

## AN EXPANDING NATION.

"We have met here," said the president at the dedication of the St. Louis exposition, "to commemorate the event which determined that we should be a great expanding nation instead of a small and stationary one."

Next to the wars which founded preserved this nation the acquisition of the Louisiana territory did indeed determine the character of our national life. It was the recording of our deliberate resolution not to stand still and be content but to move on and on, extending our government, our institutions, and our ideals.

We had had expansions before. In the midst of our struggle for freedom George Rogers Clark and his hardy riflemen had won Illinois for the newborn nation. The treaties with England after Yorktown had enlarged and rounded out our western frontier. But these were acts of military necessity and of diplomatic settlement of existing claims rather than conscious determinations toward growth. They differed spiritually by the breadth of the whole heavens from the acquisition of Louisiana.

"When we acquired it," as the president well said, "we made evident once for all that consciously and of set purpose we had embarked on a career of expansion—that we had taken our place among those daring and hardy nations who risk much with the hope and desire of winning high position among the great powers of the earth."

And for the solution of the problems of the expansion we then begun there were no precedents existing with our purposes. Until then national expansion had always resulted in either a breaking into fragments, as in the case of ancient Greece and her colonies, or a centralized tyranny, as was the end of the expansion of Rome.

We had to make our precedents. We made them, and gave the world something until then unknown—a government ruling enormous dominions and constantly swelling millions of people, yet at the same time both free and strong. There had been strong governments before, ruling great areas. There had been free governments ruling small territories. But the United States was the first government in all the world to combine great size, great strength, and freedom such as the common man had never before known.

Just one hundred years ago we became consciously, by deliberate national act, an expanding nation. We have been expanding ever since. We shall continue to expand—sometimes in territory, sometimes by the spread of our institutions and ideals—if we be worthy of the destiny offered us—until all mankind shall share our blessings and all the peoples of the earth shall live under governments

## COLLEGE FOOTBALL.

College football has been maligned as a most dangerous sport. A college professor has investigated the matter and finds reliable authority for the proposition that there are many sports more dangerous than football. Accident insurance statistics have been furnished to prove this, and some original figures have been compiled to show how comparatively harmless a sport college football actually is. Professor Dexter of Illinois university has investigated football playing and its casualties during a period of ten years in sixty American colleges and finds that during that time 210,334 students have been enrolled in these institutions of whom 22,766 or 10.8 per cent have played the game. Out of this number three have been killed, and 654 have been injured sufficiently to cause temporary absence from classes. Professor Dexter's findings and conclusions are as follows:

One student in ten in America plays football.

The proportion of students who play in small colleges, is about twice that of the universities.

The proportion of men playing is slightly decreasing.

About one in thirty-five players is injured badly enough to cause loss of time in classes.

The number of college men who are permanently injured is so small as to be practically a negligible quantity.

College football is adequately supervised in nearly all institutions.

The opinions of college officers as regards the value of the game are 27.3 to 1 in favor of football.

College football is a good healthy game and develops muscle, courage and many qualities. It is no more dangerous than coasting, rowing, swimming bicycle riding or any other form of vigorous athletic exercise and the advantages of the game far outweigh the perils. For that matter as many accidents happen in proportion to the people who take no part in athletics as to those who do and thereby develop qualities which fortify them against dangers of various kinds. Football is all right.

The convicts of the Kansas state penitentiary are to be employed in the manufacture of binding twine to relieve the farmers from the grinding oppression of the binding twine trust. Last year the trust fixed the price arbitrarily at 11 and 11 1/4 cents per pound at Kansas City. This year its prices are 10 1/2 and 10 3/4 cents. The state manufacturing plant in the penitentiary at Lansing is to offer twine at 9 1/2 and 10 cents. Kansas is thus adopting the same policy in regard to this binding twine combine that California adopted many years ago when the jute mill was installed at San Quentin to break up the jute bagging.
