MARY BAKER EDDY

Reverend Woman's Muncificent Gift to Concord

The Beautiful Site and Cash Donation to the Church Amounts to \$120,000

Concord, N. H., May 7.—Through the generous gift of the Reverend Mary Baker Eddy, the Christian Scientists of Concord, N. H., are to have one of the finest church structures in the Granite state. The plans for this edifice were presented at a largely attended church meeting last night, and work will begin upon the new structure in the near future. The gift of Mrs. Eddy includes the desirable lot of land now occupied by Christian Science Hall in the heart of the city, at the corner of State and School streets, and it is without doubt one of the finest locations in Concord for a church building.

In addition to the gift of this choice location Mrs. Eddy presents to the church a cash donation of \$100,000, making her total present represent the sum of \$120,000.

The church will be built of Concord granite as specified by Mrs. Eddy in her original deed of trust and first announced in the Concord Monitor of March 19, 1902. In response to an inquiry from the editor of that paper Mrs. Eddy made the following statement:

"On January 12, 1902 I gave a deed of trust to three individuals which conveyed to them the sum of \$100,000 to be appropriated in building a granite church edifice for First Church of Christ, Scientists in this city. Very truly,

In the fall of 1897 Mrs. Eddy purchased the property opposite the high school and adjoining the state capitol, and after remodeling the mansion into a hall and reading room at a total outlay of \$20,000 she presented Christian Science Hall and grounds to the local members for their use.

On February 22, 1899, First Church of Christ, Scientists was organized with a membership of 78. The congregation has outgrown its present quarters and the new church is required to accommodate the increase in membership which has been so remarkable.

The church will be built of the same beautiful Concord granite of which the national library building in Washington is constructed. The architecture will be Gothic, and in proportion and outline it will be in keeping with modern ideas of a church building. It is intended that the pews of the church shall seat 1000.

The trustees of the building fund who will have the oversight of the construction of the new edifice are Messrs. Fred N. Ladd, Josiah E. Dwight, and J. Wesley Plummer. Mr.

The Fish Ladder.

Fish Warden Van Dusen has been at Oregon City recently looking over the field with a view to starting the fish ladder ordered by the last legislature. A trench will be dug across the island below the falls 500 feet long and wide enough for the salmon to ascend without difficulty, and he expects to have the work done by fall. One good thing the legislature did, if it can be kept going without obstruction by Oregon City people, who have always opposed it for selfish reasons.

President Mohler, of the O. R. & N., called upon President Harrison, of the Southern Pacific Wednesday, and the two held a second conference. It is understood among railroad men that a final decision was reached to begin a survey at once for an extension of the Oregon road to be known as the Oregon Central.

It is said the Southern Pacific did not purchase the California Northwestern for local traffic alone, and that Harrison proposes to extend it north with the intention of blocking the schemes of J. J. Hill. The northern magnate has repeatedly declared that he has no intention of entering California, but it is known that his agents have looked over the ground with a view to making surveys that should find their way into California and down to San Francisco. Harrison, in the meantime, will circumvent Hills plans if possible, and it is said it was with this intention that he purchased the Donabue line, and secured control of the Oregon Short Line and O. R. & N.
