SALEM BOY IS A JUMPER

Roy Buckingham Clears the String at 5 feet 9 Inches

At the field and track meet of the Pacific Athletic association, at Berkeley Saturday afternoon, May 2, Roy Buckingham, formerly of this city, won second place in the high jump and really jumped two inches higher than the winner of the event.

Buckingham and Abbott tied for second place at 5 feet 7 inches, with a two inch handicap, while Magersstad won first at the same height because he had a three inch handicap. When Buckingham and Abbott came to jump off their tie for second place, Buckingham jumped 5 feet 9 inches, winning the place and beating the best jump made by Magersstad by 3 inches. Buckingham will probably be one of the men sent to the World's Fair at St. Louis to contest the world's championship.

BY ROPE AND BY FIRE

Albany Chinaman Stretches His Neck Fatally

Gathered Knives and Axes, but did not Like Them

Lum Dick created quite a furor in Chinatown yesterday about noon, says the Albany Herald, by hanging himself with a close line. He was cut down by Bab, a fellow celestial, before he was dead, but he received injuries from his drop that will probably give him a clear shipping receipt to his future abode. Lum doubtless had brooded over the trials and tribulations that befell him in this sphere, and had prepared for some time to change his address. He purchased a large-sized Bowie knife a few days ago, but that means did not exactly suit his taste. Then he gathered together all the meat cleavers in that part of Mongoliaville, with a view of using them to assist him in his expected journey, but they were discarded along with the knife, and the three implements were found on the rafters where Lum attached one end of his rope. He also carried up an ax, and had surrounded himself with a regular butcher's arsenal. Yesterday morning he acted "queen" and was placed under surveillance by his countrymen. Despite their efforts, he carried his bedclothes

ing up on the rafters over his room and set them on fire. Then making one end of a clothes line secure to a cross beam, he stuck his heathen head through a loop on the other end, and dropped about seven feet. The noise attracted the attention of Bab and several other Orientals, who hurried to the scene and cut the rope and extinguished the fire. Sheriff Huston, Chief of Police McClain and Dr. Davis were called, but the queue wearer was found in an unconscious condition, and was not taken into custody. Dr. Davis pronounced the injuries as probably fatal. He is suffering from paralysis of the spinal chord, and concussion of the brain, and will likely enjoy his contemplated trip into eternity. Lum is about 50 years of age, and has worked over in Benton county for several years. He recently complained of being sick, and brooding over his ill health and consequent inability to work led him to believe that his career of usefulness had passed. He has been a resident of Albany and vicinity about 30 years, and was quite well known.

CORBETT JEFFRIES AND WHAT?

The Two Jims to Meet Again in the Fistic Arena

Training Will Soon Begin, and Jeffries will Have a Struggle to Get Down to Weight

Jim Jeffries and Jim Corbett have begun maneuvers for their coming fight. The articles of agreement say that the battle shall take place in June or July, whichever month is chosen, the men must be in training quarters within a few weeks. They are both now in the East. They must journey across the continent, select their training staffs and quarters and finally close their agreement to fight before the Yosemite Athletic club. It will take time, and there is not much to lose. A report from New York has it that Bob Fitzsimmons will train Jeffries for the mill with Corbett. It would add interest to the fight should Fitzsimmons take a hand one way or other, and I would not be surprised to see the Cornishman in Jeffries' corner telling the big fellow how to put one over on the cleverest of the heavyweights. In fact, it seems like a reasonable arrangement. There is no doubt that Jeffries was greatly worried by his inability to land on Corbett the last time they fought. The former champion was so elusive that Jeffries had trouble shifting his big body fast enough to get near Corbett. It tantalized him to aim a blow at Corbett's head and find he was hitting nothing but air. Jeffries wants to do a quick job with Corbett if he can, and there are not many men in the country who can show him how to turn the trick," writes Malachy Hogan in the Record-Herald.

"Tommy Ryan could handle Jeffries for such a fight, but he is no longer on speaking terms with the champion. There is not much of a chance that they will make it up. Ryan sued Jeffries for money after their last split, and the men have been enemies ever since. Aside from Ryan, Fitzsimmons is perhaps the best man in the country to show Jeffries the best way to corner Corbett. Fitzsimmons knows boxing so well, is so clever himself and has had so much experience that, as Jeffries' trainer, he ought to be a valuable man. It is not likely that Jeffries would break away from Bill Delaney, even if Fitzsimmons should be a member of the champion's training party. Delaney and Jeffries had a spat after the Fitzsimmons fight, but they made it up. Delaney represented Jeffries when the articles for the fight were signed at Baltimore, and was also the champion's agent when the bids were opened April 1, and the fight awarded to the Yosemite Athletic club. Delaney is a shrewd adviser and knows how to handle the champion. At the same time, with two such strong minded men in the camp as Delaney and Fitzsimmons, there might be a clash. At all events, the arrangements will be made soon. When the bids were opened it was agreed that all the parties to the fight should meet in San Francisco on May 15 and decide all the details.

"Corbett has given no hint yet as to whom he will have in his training squad. He is a man who directs his own training more than most fighters. When he prepared for the former fight with Jeffries, his work was a big surprise. The public had come to think that he was a dead one, and that he could not get into fighting trim. He worked carefully and quietly, and the story is told that he pretended drunkenness on one occasion just to fool Jeffries and cause the champion to believe that he was not taking care of himself. When he got into the ring he was almost perfect. It was a mighty surprise to all of Jeffries' people when Corbett stripped for action. His work in the fight showed that he was far from being the 'lobster' that he had been pictured. It is too early to begin comparing the men. The comparison is only one of condition anyway. There are stories that Jeffries has been indulging himself rather freely and reports that Corbett has been doing gymnastic work for several months. I have no personal information as to Jeffries, but I do know that Corbett has prepared for this fight as he never prepared for any other. Like nearly all fight followers, I am unable to see where Corbett has the right to whip Jeffries, unless by outpointing him, but at the same time I look for Cor-

bett to make one of the best fights of his career."

Iowa Federation of Labor.

Davenport, Ia., May 12.—Accredited delegates from every part of the state filled the hall today when the 11th annual convention of the Iowa State Federation of Labor was called to order by President Arthur H. Holder of Des Moines. In his annual address the president congratulated the convention upon the marvelous strides organized labor has made in Iowa of late years and exhorted his hearers to continue the work of organization. The growth of the state body was further shown in the figures contained in the annual report of the secretary J. H. Strief of Sioux City. The secretary's report showed that during the past twelve months many new charters have been issued. The present membership exceeds 45,000, divided among 730 different unions.

Reports and committees appointed occupied the opening session. Following the routine business the convention went into session behind closed doors for the consideration of various matters of interest. It is anticipated that politics will play an important part in the convention as the Socialists, it is said, will make a determined effort to gain control of the federation. Marshalltown and Council Bluffs are rival candidates for next year's meeting place of the federation.
