A Farmer's Road Ideas

Maclean, Or., May 11, 1903.
 Ed. Journal. The problem of good roads is attracting widespread attention. Just at this season of the year, here in the Willamette valley, we are engaged in putting into execution various ideas of road building. Some are better than others, some are worse than none, so it seems to me that it is time to hit on a plan that will insure us good roads, and have them all alike.

My idea of a good road is one that is at least 26 feet wide on top, with a good ditch on each side, the road being as nearly level on top as is consistent with good drainage. The manner of making so many roads only wide enough for a wagon is exasperating to a farmer, when hauling hay or moving a harvester. A road should be wide enough for vehicles to pass without tilting, or being in danger of overturning.

There should be system in road building, as in everything else. Some plan for building roads should be adopted, and that plan should be followed, even if the state legislature has to enact a law making it compulsory.

Paving up the middle of the road is wasted time; let the road remain solid, using the dirt from the ditches to fill up mudholes and hollows.

I do not expect to complete such roads as are here planned in one year, but what is done on any road each year should make that road better, and in a few years they can be brought to the state I have outlined. Such roads would give other people a better opinion of our state, and of us. By all means let us have system; let us have good roads, and have them all alike.

King Edward in Edinburgh.

Edinburgh, May 13.—The second day of King Edward's visit to the Scottish metropolis was a busy one, beginning at 10 o'clock this morning with an inspection of the Black Watch in Dalkeith Park and ending at a late hour in the afternoon with the formal opening of a new hospital at Colinton. After the inspection of the Black Watch and the presentation of South African medals to the officers and men of that regiment the King and Queen left Dalkeith for Holyrood house, where they took lunch. The decorated streets of the capital were crowded with spectators and their Majesties met with joyous acclamation.

In the afternoon, the King and Queen visited Edinburgh castle, St. Giles' Cathedral and the Royal Infirmary, where the King presided at the opening of the new pavilion. The drive to Colinton Mans was made by way of George IV. Bridge and Lauriston and the return trip to Dalkeith by way of Braid Hills and Gilmerton, without returning to Edinburgh.

Ambassador Choate's Son to Wed.

London, May 13.—Mrs. Choate, wife of the ambassador, and Miss Choate sailed today for the United States to attend the wedding of Joseph Choate, Jr., and Miss Cora Oliver, the latter part of this month. The ambassador is much disappointed because his official duties here will prevent his attending the wedding.

Albany, N. Y., May 13.—The wedding of Joseph Choate, Jr., and Miss Cora Oliver will take place in this city and will be a notable event. The bride-elect is the daughter of General Robert Shaw Oliver, one of Albany's richest and most influential men, widely traveled and a famous wit. Miss Oliver's grandfather was General Rathbone, and her aunt, Miss Alice Rathbone, who was a great beauty, was married to William Phelps Eno of New York.

Joseph Choate, Jr., was an honor man at Harvard, is a celebrated golfer and is a fine, stalwart type of American manhood. He has been in service as third secretary of the American Embassy in London, and is on an indefinite leave.
