

WHEN THE PRESIDENT COMES

Committee has Completed Arrangements for Reception

Marion Square will be Dedicated by Turning it Over to Oregon's First Crop-its Children

The marshals of the day, who will have charge of the procession Thursday, May 21st, upon the occasion of the President's visit, met yesterday afternoon and discussed the features of their part of the program. It was decided to get uniforms, but as yet the committee have not agreed upon the style and color.

The city police and sheriff will take charge of the crowd at the depot and also at Marion square. Ropes will be stretched completely around Marion square, as the entire square is to be reserved for school children and their teachers.

A platform will be built on the west steps of the state house, from which the President will address the public.

The report of the program committee, with the exception of the list of whom shall occupy the carriages in the procession, is given herewith in full, as follows:

"To the General Committee on Reception of President Roosevelt:

"Gentlemen: Your committee on program would respectfully report that it has not been able to determine whether a foot parade accompanying the presidential party in the drive through the city is advisable, but is inclined to the belief that it is not.

"If that view be adopted, the plan we suggest is as follows:

"The Salem military company, to act as a guard of honor at the depot,

as the presidential train arrives, assisting the local officers and committees in keeping the crowds from disturbing the party or retarding its progress.

The Procession.

"The presidential party to be placed in their respective carriages as expeditiously as possible at the depot, their allotted local escorts being already seated. The procession to proceed on Twelfth street to state, down State to Commercial, on Commercial to Marion, on Marion to Front, on Front to Union; the carriages to line on Union street, north of the square. The veterans of the Philippine war to form a guard of honor between there and the stand, to which the party will march from their carriages.

Children to Sing "America."

In the meantime, the children of the several schools of this city and the surrounding country that may wish to attend in a body, are to be appropriately massed in the square, so that the President can see and address them, and hear them sing 'America.' All persons, except accompanying teachers and the children are to be excluded from the square, and for this purpose we advise the appointment of at least 40 men to surround the square, and to be supplied with necessary ropes and due authority to keep out the grown people.

"At the close of these ceremonies, the presidential party to be driven on Union street to Commercial, on Commercial to Center, on Center to High, on High to Court, on Court to Capital, the carriages to line up to the east side of the state capitol grounds, where the party will dismount and march to the east main entrance of the capitol. At this point the members of the G. A. R. to form the guard of honor, through which the party will pass to the capitol.

Program at Capitol.

Carriages for the Party.
"Sixteen carriages, at least, will be required to accommodate the party and the local escorts that it is thought advisable to place with them, and if the entire legislative committee should be present, even more carriages will be necessary. We have made allotments of local escorts, which is herewith submitted for your consideration and revision. In this we have provided seats for President Brownell and Speaker Harris, and we have four carriages wherein six escorts can be accommodated—those to be appropriated for the legislative committee.

"Judge Bennett, chairman of the general committee, to have charge of the meeting at the capitol, and to be master of ceremonies."
The carriage arrangements are not as yet fully completed by the committee, and will be published later.
