IS NOT INSANE JUST MAD

Lane County Officials the Subject of Burr's Wrath

Have Separated Him From His Money and Want to Minister to Him in Installments

They have things well arranged down in Lane county, according to the Register. It seems there is a man down that way named Anthony Burr. In some way, the account shows not how, the county clerk is in possession of about \$1000 belonging to Burr. It is presumed, for the purposes of this article, that the county clerk holds the money through the orders of the court, and that he is not influenced by hope of reward or fear of punishment in keeping the same. Burr, it seems, is accused of being insane, or mad, but the doctors say it is only the latter, and that the reason therefor is the retention of money admittedly his. The Register's statement is rather vague. It does not indicate that Burr had shown signs of mental aberration, got hilarious, imagined that he could play base ball, or even insisted that he came from the nearby town of Springfield. It can only be gathered that Burr had a big \$1000. This, of course, is not in itself conclusive evidence of insanity, even in the center of the concentrating circles of wealth in the village at the head of the valley; yet it becomes a matter of deep suspicion, and a proper subject for the consideration of the county court. It is a very large sum of money; really too large for any one man to have; providing, of course, he doesn't own a bank, run a newspaper, or hold office in St. Louis; but still a man may retain that amount even in the height of the beer season without being "bug house." The doctors say Burr is perfectly sane but awfully mad—and getting madder. He wants his money, and he wants it all. This seems unreasonable to the officials of Lane county. They cannot realize that any man can be so bound up to one system, and so prejudiced against the financial breakfast-food system, they want to work on him.

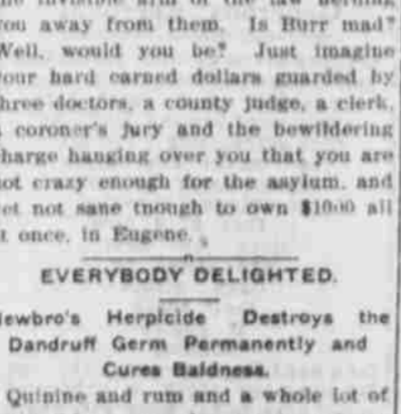
