NON-PARTISAN ADMINISTRATION.

It is expected that Governor Chamberlain will honor the party that nominated him, and which he has always associated, with appointments. It is expected that he will make up his official family and his political appointees from the ranks of stalwart Democrats.

But it is also expected that he will continue to regard to right of the people to have non-partisan service in purely non-political branches of the public service.

Governor Chamberlain has regarded this principle in selecting regents of the educational institutions, and in making up non-political boards and commissions.

He is showing the same wise regard for public sentiment, and consideration for the non-partisan spirit that elected him to office, in keeping a Republican in the office of prison physician. There is being brought to bear a great deal of partisan pressure to force the employment of a Democrat in that office.

The present physician has a splendid record for competence. He has kept the sanitary condition of the prison excellent, and with less than the usual amount of doping and surgery.

He is a popular and respected gentleman among the employers and prisoners. Dr. Cusick stands high in the profession and as a citizen. His retention would mean that an efficient professional man cannot be removed under a Democratic administration to make room for a partisan.

Governor Chamberlain should give his brother Democrats a plain and lasting example that they cannot get the votes of the people by making a non-partisan appeal about election time, and then rudely setting it aside.

GIVE US ALL A GRAB.

Politics is no longer on the high and lofty range of statesmanship that prevailed in the days of Webster, Clay and Calhoun.

From the standpoint of individual morality the politician of today is a paragon of sobriety and virtue compared to those characters.

But about all the average community can see in a representative in congress today is an errand boy to get them an office, a pension or a chance to grab public land.

Salem wants big appropriations for the federal building, for the Indian school, for the bars in the Willamette river.

These matters are cold, barren commercialism, still they are characteristic of the spirit and age of the people.

With all thy faults we love thee still, dear country of ours. We are not a failure when the worst is said.

Back of the spirit of commercialism there is the sturdy common sense of the American people that makes for progress out of the worst conditions.

Pensions mean distribution of money among the masses who have a happy faculty of not keeping it in possession.

Appropriations mean a larger wage fund and greater comfort for the people in better public schools, better mail service, better transportation.

The evil of offices and the grabbing of public lands will correct itself under a system that is subject to changes in the former and rapid alienations in the latter.

No one can grab more than about six feet on some hilltop, after all is said and done.

So let us not despair. We are not living in an age when great statesmanship is needed in congressmen. Loyalty and stability, devoted service to the little, mean, sordid affairs of the common herd have some merit.

JUDGES AND THE CLERKS

Those Who Will Count the Ballots on June 1

The Marion county commissioners' court held a busy session Tuesday, and succeeded in cleaning up the business of the term.

J. Schar and others petitioned the court for county aid to cut down a hill on the west side of Pudding river, on the road leading from Howell to Silverton, agreeing to donate volunteer

work to the amount of \$150. An order was made by the court that \$50 be donated by Marion county toward the work contemplated.

Chas. Phillips was appointed constable to fill the vacancy existing in Scott's Mills precinct.

The court made an order granting to Seb. Scharbach a monthly allowance of \$5, and P. W. Mess was appointed disbursing agent.

The petition of M. W. Cline, et al. for the location of a county road near Silverton was continued.

In the matter of the petition of A. Tanzler and others for county aid to improve the public highways in and around Gervais, the court made an order donating an amount equal to 40 per cent of the amount subscribed by the residents of Gervais district.

J. H. Albert petitioned the court for a perpetual right of way along the public highways from Mehama to Salem, for the erecting of poles and stringing of wires for the purpose of transmitting power by electricity.

The petition was granted, with the provision, however, that work on the line is to be commenced within six months, and completed on or before one year from the date of the order, and that the company be made liable to damages. The county court is to designate the location of poles along the highways.

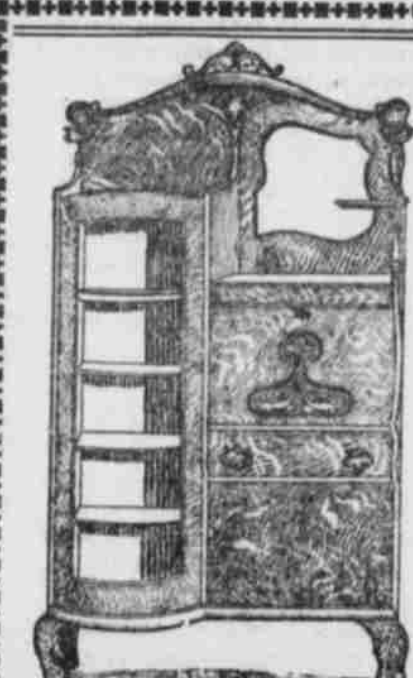
