BREAKS

RECORD

Lebudy Brothers' Dirigible
Balloon Makes Fast FlightParis, May 8.—Two remarkable air
ship tests were made today, one by
Santos-Dumont, and the other by the
new dirigible balloon of the Lebudy
brothers. The latter attempt was a
record breaker, the air ship passing
over a distance of twenty-three miles
in about an hour and a half, over sev-
eral suburban towns, encircling a ca-
thedral spire, performing evolutions
over the famous Rosny castle, and
returning to Paris in safety. During
the entire trip there was a brisk
wind, and the air ship displayed per-
fect dirigible qualities, being under
complete control of the aeronauts at
all times.Philo Jouhmes and Engineer Rey
were in the car of the Lebudy air
ship. The start was made at 9 a. m.
at St. Marin. There was a light rain
falling, and the ship rose gracefully
into the teeth of the wind. The bal-
loon passed over Limay, Mantes, and
Rosny in turn. The inhabitants,
greatly excited, ran out into the
streets and acclaimed the aeronauts
with shouts. They answered by
waving flags. A turn in the course
was made at Mantes. The airship
swung in a wide circle around the
spire of the cathedral at a height of
about 200 feet above the ground, and
went off diagonally against the wind.
A squall struck the balloon while
crossing the Chateau de Rosny, but
Jouhmes, to show the perfect control
of his craft, put the balloon through
a series of evolutions, sailing up and
down and in wide spirals.The then returned to her point of
departure, where she descended with-
out accident. The distance covered
was 37 kilometers, in 1 hour, 36 min-
utes, against Santos-Dumont's record
for the Deutsch prize of 11½ kilo-
meters in 30 minutes.

Air Ship Practical.

The Temps says that in view of the
rate and wind the results obtained are
notable, making aerial navigation in
dirigible balloons appear to enter the
domain of practical reality.H. Jouhmes furnished a report of
the trip in which he said the air ship
obeyed perfectly and was under per-
fect control. The screws revolved 500
times per minute, which speed was in-
creased to 1000 revolutions when sail-
ing against the strong current of wind
on rounding the chateau de Rosny.

Santos-Dumont Successful.

Santos-Dumont made his first free
ascent of the season in his new air
ship, No. 9, this afternoon, from the
balloon park at Neuilly, where the
aeronaut has constructed a vast shed
in which are several of his air ships.

Frank Gorrell has brought action
for damages against Douglas county
to recover the sum of 11,266.70 on ac-
count of injuries received in the fall
of the county bridge across Hubbard
creek last July.Conducted by a guide rope to the ba-
gelle drill ground in the Bois de Bou-

on the ground. As Santos-Dumont
did not have permission from the

its shed.Santos-Dumont is satisfied with his
ascent, which soon will be repeated.
He said No. 9 is the smallest air
ship he has constructed, the cubes be-
ing of only 234 meters, and the motor
of three-horse power. No. 9, however,
has a rudder surface of 12 square me-
ters. This ship is only intended for
experiments leading up to tests of No.
10, which has cubes of 2100 meters,
and which is intended to carry 12
persons. The aeronaut expects to be
ready to make the trials with No. 10
in a month.In the shed at Neuilly is air ship
No. 7, with cubes of 1200 meters ca-
pacity, which has been especially con-
structed to enter the contests at the
St. Louis exposition.A Florida
HurricaneJacksonville, Fla., May 13.—A heavy
gale has been raging here since last
night. Portions of the city are flood-
ed, and boats are being used. At the
terminal station the water works are
partly under water.

Rich Piece of Rock.

Baker City, Or., May 13.—A man
named Peters brought in a piece of
gold quartz rock today weighing 80
pounds which he deposited in the Cit-
izens' bank. The rock is said to con-
tain about \$3000 worth of gold. It
was found in the John Day river, in
Grant county, and has every appear-
ance of being a piece of quartz broken
from a ledge and washed down from
the mountain by the stream. The sur-
face is worn smooth by erosion.The gold can be plainly seen in the
rock in large globules and nuggets.
The owners are reticent as to the ex-
act location where the nugget was
found.
