MANSFIELD HAS LOST HIS LAND

The Breitenbush Hot Springs Taken by Government

Commissioner W. A. Richard, of the General Land Office, Reverses Decision of the Local Officials

Claude H. Mansfield has just been deprived of a quarter section of land in township 4 south, range 7 east, in the Oregon City land district, Commissioner W. A. Richards, of the general land office, reversing the local office, and taking the ground that the entryman had not complied with the homestead law.

The land is officially described as the northeast quarter of section 20, township 9 south, range 7 east, and comprises 160 acres. On the property are the well-known Breitenbush Hot Springs, which have been visited annually for many years by residents of the Willamette valley. These springs are noted for their good properties, and such men as Hon. J. K. Weatherford, of Albany; W. T. Clark, A. T. F. Hickman, John Daly, William E. Thomas, Charles Thomas, J. H. Davis, E. R. Parker, William Hughes, C. E. Short, and others testified to their medicinal value. The land nestles in the extreme southeastern portion of Marion county, close to Mount Jefferson.

The attention of the land officials was first called to the land by S. B. Ormsby, who was then forest superintendent. In 1901 Mansfield made entry, and alleged that he had made settlement January 7, 1888. Ormsby made a protest, stating that Mansfield had never made settlement, never had a residence there, never in good faith been his home, never cultivated any part of the land; that alleged improvements were of inconsiderable value; that no settlement or cultivation was made on the lands before they were withdrawn from settlement by the President of the United States; that the land was within the boundaries of the Cascade forest reservation, and not subject to private entry. Upon these grounds Superintendent Ormsby filed a contest in the name of the United States. The register and receiver of the local office rendered a decision in favor of the contestee, and dismissed the contest. The general land office has just reversed the decision, and says in part:

The evidence shows that the entryman claims to have made settlement on the land in question on the 7th day of January, 1888, and that his residence upon and cultivation of the same has been continuous since that date. A number of witnesses testified on the part of the government that they had been frequent visitors to the land for the purpose of using the water of the hot springs; that the land was regarded as vacant, unappropriated public lands, and under such

believe certain named persons built bath houses, dwelling houses, and built trails and cleared and cultivated portions of the land.

William Hughes, a practicing physician of Oregon City, declared that he is well acquainted with the land in question; that he himself and Dr. Taylor of Lebanon, Ore., first discovered the springs on the land in 1889, and that they built a log cabin bath house, and cleared up a part of the land near the springs, and said improvements were made not only for their personal use, but for the general public; that they visited the spring each year from 1889 to 1899, and that during all those years, during which the entryman claims to have made continuous residence, that he made no improvements whatever, and they have never even saw him on the land, and never were aware that he had made any claim as to the same until the spring or fall of 1901.

It is shown that the entryman resided at different periods during the time claimed as continuously residing on the land, at Mill City, Albany and in Idaho; it is also satisfactorily shown that his wife made only occasional visits to the land; in fact, there is little set forth in the evidence to indicate that his residence upon the land was other than that of many others, who came there each year for the purpose of using the water. It is not shown that the entryman ever resided upon the land in good faith, and with the apparent intention of making it a home; he assumed no control or anything relative to the same. These springs seemed to have been used by the general public every year since they were discovered. It is shown that a large part of the improvements on the land and the trail leading to the same were made by those persons, and not by the entryman. His continuous residence was a mere pretense; his entry appears not to have been made in good faith and for a home, but for the purpose of profit and speculation.

Arranging for Jeffries-Corbett Go. San Francisco, May 15.—Champion Jeffries and James J. Corbett are in the city, with their respective followers and trainers, and this evening they are expected to get together to arrange the final details for their contest in August. It is not expected that any difficulty will be encountered in agreeing on the final terms for the fight. All of the arrangements were outlined at their conference in New York some time ago, and little remains to be done. In all probability Eddie Grant will be selected to referee the contest.

From now on the two fighters will put in their time in preparation for the contest. It is expected that Jeffries will spend the most of his time in the vicinity of Los Angeles, his former home, and which he considers an ideal locality for training. He will be assisted by Bob Fitzsimmons and several others. Corbett will be assisted in his work of preparation by his two brothers and "Yank" Kenny.
