KURTZ SERVICE SOLD OUT.

As The Journal predicted, the projected Kurtz electric light service has been sold to the old light and power company.

If the council had been hasty in granting a franchise to Mr. Kurtz that probably would also have been transferred.

The impossibility of granting a franchise that could not have been sold to a competing company must have struck the council with force.

If it did not, they would have been impressed with that fact before it had been out of their hands for any great length of time.

The Salem Light, Power & Traction Company, under the ownership of Mr. Henry, will use the power sent to the city limit over the Kurtz line.

That does away with all hope of competition from that source, and the community will have to depend for the present on fair treatment at the hands of Mr. Henry.

There is no doubt that Mr. Kurtz had a tip that the Salem plant was about to change hands, and he sought a franchise at a most critical time, when it would have been worth a large sum of money to him.

The Journal is happy to say that the council had the wisdom to not bite hastily, and are probably glad that they acted deliberately.

The negotiations with Mr. Kurtz bore good fruit for the city in securing an extension of the low-rate contract the city now enjoys.

Recorder Judah and the haysed aldermen deserve credit for the concessions they have secured on city lighting.

To that extent the community is under obligations to Mr. Kurtz.

NATIVE SONS IN POLITICS.
Rumors, the Democratic candidate for congress, persists in working the Native Sons claim for election, and is making some headway. It is said.

He may claim the election if he succeeds on that basis, and there is already talk about organizing the foreign-born voters and descendants of foreign-born citizens to oppose his election.

Both propositions are wrong in principle, but it is natural that pressure for the Native Sons' vote should stimulate the opposition of those who are foreign-born or of foreign descent.

As Mr. Reames began the work on this line of division in politics he cannot object to those who would be discriminated against if he succeeds also in organizing.

Of course, if the foreign-born voters and their descendants and the voters who are not native sons went together he would be beaten out of sight.

We hope this will not be done. We trust that there will never be a foreign-born and anti-foreign-born division in politics. There is no room for it, and it should not be encouraged.

It is un-American in the broadest sense of the term to raise any question as to whether a man is born in Oregon, or any other state or country, so long as he is a law-abiding citizen, and respects the flag and obeys the law and upholds American institutions.

SALEM A CARNIVAL CITY.

Salem can well claim to be a carnival city this coming mid-summer. In the midst of beautiful surroundings, the most beautiful Capital City of the Northwest, with borders increasing and population growing with every incoming train, there is that in the condition and prestige of the community that invites to rejoicing.

The city has long been known as a center of churches, and it is due to its highly moral and religious character that large Sunday excursions from all the leading cities in the state have been coming to Salem during the summer months for a number of years.

Those throngs have numbered at times as high as six thousand in a single day. They came and went and enjoyed themselves in their own way, harming no one, and getting the benefit of an outing that could be had on no other occasion.

So it is fitting that Salem should take advantage of her growing popularity, and invite still larger multitudes to share her hospitality and opportunities for recreation. The world will have its amusements and play-spells. The congregating of people in large cities and manufacturing centers is not conducive to morality. Scattering them, bringing them in touch with a healthier moral tone, mingling with the people from the country, taking an enjoyable day off for harmless amusements, is beneficial to mankind. The city of Salem is a home and residence community, a city of public institutions, with extensive transportation facilities, and spacious grounds for the accommodation of large numbers of visitors. It is an ideal carnival city, and the first Mid-Summer Carnival has been wisely planned for this purpose.

The Mid-Summer Carnival, planned from the 29th of June to the Fourth of July, will be the greatest program of entertainment ever offered the people of Oregon. It will be at the most beautiful season of the year, and before the heavier harvests of the summer begin. It will be at a time when the people will have the most leisure, and before entering on the important duties of harvesting grain, fruit and hops. It will be at a time when all are in a jolly mood for fun and for sightseeing.

For that purpose the Carnival Committee has secured a continuous round of amusement, a circus and menagerie, and performances and street parades, and orators and music, to the heart's content of the thousands that will be here every day for a week. All this has been done regardless of expense, and in the lavish and generous way for which Salem is noted. The

carnival will be conducted in the Salem way—along the lines of clean, wholesome legitimate amusement, with all objectionable features eradicated—the way Salem management always does things.

The Carnival will not be the only attraction during the mid-summer season. There will be the Shiloh Park and Summer Theater, the usual attractions at the Grand Opera House, of opera and theater.

The Salem stores in themselves will be attractions of no small order or importance. It has become a fashion to give musical and phonographic concerts at many of our prominent places of business almost nightly. There is almost no limit to the variety of entertainment that can be had.

LET BUILDING GO FORWARD.

There is no good reason why there should not be large and extensive building operations at Salem this summer and fall.

A hundred residences and cottages are needed to accommodate the families that are coming to the city.

An era of building and improvement of this kind means the employment of hundreds of mechanics and business in all lines.

The price of material and labor ought not to stand in the way, if a full understanding of the situation can be had with both sides.

If there is any misunderstanding that has put a stop to the era of improvements, let there be a conference and let it be wiped out of existence.

This community cannot afford to have any interruption of its development growing out of such conditions of hostility as prevail at Portland.

The mechanics and laboring men who have families to support should be given the largest chance to get employment on favorable terms.

We should not degenerate so much into a town where the women and girls are the principal wage earners, as at present.

Let us strike for conditions that will put hundreds of mechanics and laborers on continuous payrolls.

This is the only way to make Salem the live and progressive labor town it should be, and will have to be in order to grow.

Let steps be taken to inaugurate an era of good feeling, and let it be said Salem is the one town where labor and capital co-operate.

THE COUNCIL SHOULD ACCEPT.

The city council should accept Mr. Henry's proposition to continue the present lighting rate for a term of years.

If that is done Greater Salem will have the cheapest lighting of any city in the state, and the remotest boundaries of the city can be illuminated, if the taxpayers want to have it done.

With increasing cost of fuel and the way water powers are being picked up, it is doubtful if the city can ever secure so favorable a contract again in the future.

The Journal believes that one further concession should be made in this connection, if the city extends the lighting contract with Mr. Henry, even at the present low rates.

The school houses should be furnished with free lights. They are not lighted often, but when needed the lights should be there. About three or four times a year evening entertainments are given.

The houses do not need lighting enough to make the district a profitable patron for the lighting company. But this convenience should be in the school houses, and would cost the company but little.

Recently an entertainment was given in one of the school houses by the children and teachers for the library fund. To put a light in for one evening, under the old management, cost \$7.50.

If Mr. Henry would concede this convenience to the school district, the boundaries of which are coincident with Greater Salem, it would be very much appreciated, and we believe he could afford to do so.

The Journal only makes this as a suggestion, and hopes it may be considered both by the city and the corporation asking a new contract.

Titled Marriages Opposed.

The twelfth annual convention of the Daughters of the Revolution was opened in New York recently with a special service held in St. Paul's church, at which 1200 members of the society and their friends were present. The Rev. Robert Morris Kemp, who preached the sermon, pleaded for the perpetuation of the highest traditions of patriotism by the women of America, and protested against the establishment in this country of aristocracy of birth and wealth and the marriage of American women with titled foreigners. The Rev. Kemp said in part:

"Patriotic societies such as ours have, I take it, to part in, as they have no reason for, establishing an aristocracy of birth, in this land dedicated by our forefathers as one of equal rights and privileges to all, any more than they have in condoning that far more reprehensible aristocracy of wealth, which often appears showing its hideous mien among us, and which seems often emphasized in the marriage of our fair young womanhood to the titles of impetuous—often mis-called—noblemen. Is this not display to the blood our forefathers shed?"

Pioneers Want a Chance.
