BOARD OF HEALTH.

The law establishing a State Board of Health, and making county judges and county physicians, where there is a county physician, and the county judge alone, where there is no county physician, members of the state board of health, was approved Feb. 17, 1902. It has been in force now three months and not a single birth, death or case of sickness, required by this law to be reported, has yet been reported by any physician, nurse or patient to the county judge of Lane county, although perhaps more than a hundred such cases have occurred during this time. The law is likely to remain almost a dead letter for some time, at least, for the reason that the people of Oregon will have to be educated up to it, and at present, as indicated by the past three months since the law has been in force, or the past one month since it was printed and circulated, the physicians, nurses, and patients, cannot or will not comply with its provisions, which require a great deal of care and attention for which no compensation is provided. However the county judge has received several requests recently to quarantine individuals or families. If these requests are complied with, as the law seems to contemplate, they will soon become quite frequent, and will add not a little to the expenses of the county.

The law provides for the appointment by the governor with the consent of the senate of a state board of health composed of six physicians and a secretary, and makes a permanent annual appropriation of \$5000 to pay the salary of the secretary and the traveling and other expenses of the members of the board. It clothes them with practically unlimited power and authorizes them to go when and where, and do what, they please, but does not state how the expenses are to be paid of the quarantine and the many other things they, and the county judges and county physicians, may do or order to be done, but the inference is that the counties where these expenses are incurred must pay them. It is likely to develop into a very expensive official infant industry which will require increasing protection from the taxpayers as it increases in age and strength.

Following are some of the provisions of this law:
The county judge and the county physician shall constitute a county board of health. If there is no county physician, the county judge shall act as health officer, and constitute the county board of health. It shall be the duty of the county board of health to collect all vital statistics, and keep a record thereof, and report to secretary of the state board of health monthly, not later than the tenth day, all infectious diseases, deaths, and causes thereof, places of burial of every person having died in said county, and in case of birth of any child, giving the name of its parents, their residence, and their occupation, that may have been reported to said board of health during the preceding month. Every county board of health shall have the power to quarantine against any other county, or counties,

or adjoining state, and shall also have power to quarantine against any case, or cases, of infectious disease within the county, and shall have power to call upon all police officers, sheriffs, constables, and all county officers to enforce such quarantine, subject to the authority of the state health officers. The state board of health shall have power and authority to order nuisances, or the cause of any special disease or mortality, to be abated and removed. Any person who shall fail to obey or shall violate such orders, shall, on conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than \$100, at the discretion of the court. It shall be the duty of every physician, midwife or head of the family, under whose charge any birth occurs, to report the same to the county or city health officer before the last day of the month in which birth occurs. Every physician, midwife, nurse, or head of the family, under whose charge any death occurs, must report the same to the county or city health officer, within 48 hours, or as soon thereafter as practicable. Every physician or other person, under whose charge any infectious or epidemic disease occurs, must report the same to the county court or health officers immediately. Any undertaker, head of a family, or other person shall not bury, cremate, or cause to be cremated or buried, the body of any person until the death certificate is properly filled out and sent to the health officers of the county or city in which said burial or cremation is to occur. Any person violating any section of this act, or any part thereof, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined not less than \$10 nor more than \$100.

PORTLAND AND THE BIG FAIR

Citizen Calls Attention to Our Neighbors Greed

Ed. Journal: A correspondent in one of the valley newspapers has called attention to the insignificance of the appropriation of \$500,000 to hold a world's fair in Portland in 1905. The determination of Portland to have this fair at any cost, has set efforts on foot to block the matter being referred to the people, for fear, possibly, that the appropriation will be voted down. Inasmuch as the people have to foot the cost of this show, it is at least courteous to mention it to the people. Portland has brought much argument to bear upon the necessity of this fair, and holds out promising returns to the state in general. In fact she is entertaining the same opinion about the presidential party she is about the fair. According to her papers, Portland has an option upon President Roosevelt while he is in Oregon, the president dropping off at Salem merely for the purpose of seeing the place where Portland makes laws for Oregon. This fact is supported by the committee in charge of the presidential party refusing to have the celebration take place in the band stand in Marion square, as requested by the C. C. I. League, and holding it in the state house. The president, I understand, is very anxious to see this place on account of the prominence and importance with which the city of Portland has regulated and managed things for Salem. A prominent Portlander told me yesterday that if it hadn't been for the President's natural desire to view battle-grounds he would have overlooked Salem entirely and gone on to Astoria. The president also anxious, very anxious, to see the place where the Multnomah delegation voted to tax the corporations making their wealth out of the state, after they got the rest of the representatives from all over the state to vote for their fair bill. Appropos the matter of corporation tax it might be well to call attention to the fact that the general manager of the Southern Pacific railroad in California refused to donate a cent towards defraying the plans for entertaining the president while he was in San Francisco. The manager said the company was deadheading the president through California and Oregon at a cost of about \$6000 to the company and he thought that was good enough. The question naturally arises what induced the company to lose this \$6000 when there is nothing

However, we are assured from day to day that there are some very creditable specimens of high-bred and high-bred attractions in Oregon which will draw a large crowd. We would be able to collect some excellent specimens from the ranks of our politicians. Some of them are highly skilled in juggling and "skinning the cat," as the boys call it. Contortionists are thick and could put up a lovely performance. The only great objection to the political department of this world's fair is that in order to give Portland her due and public recognition, it would be necessary to have this part of the fair in Salem in the state house. Here the Portland performance could be carried on under more natural conditions, and many of the old niches, footholds, and ear marks would come handy in the acrobatic performance. Other attractions could be made up at Portland very nicely. The new dry dock for instance will be completed by that time and would make a fine display. Then she could put her fire boat on exhibition and have it squirt water on the banks where about a million dollars worth of saw and planing mills recently burned down or up, whichever you please. Then the visitors could ride up and down the inclined plane—that is, if they were "inclined" to—which reaches from Portland clear up to Portland Heights. The city park which is now full of beautiful and growing trees, would also make a nice lunch ground for Expositors. So many other things could be mentioned, but it is unnecessary because it will all be fixed up at Portland without any trouble to the rest of the state.

Elephants in the "Union"

Miss Gertrude Lanahan, daughter of one of the important distillers in America recently returned from a year's trip around the world. She tells how she was interested and amused while in India by the way in which the elephants that piled teak wood on the road to Mandalay work under a well-defined system of rights and privileges.

"A great ponderous beast will swing a piece of timber into designated position with the nicety of a pulley and crane, and then move off a few paces and inspect it in an apparent endeavor to ascertain whether it is plumb with some other hundred pieces of lumber, with the critical eye and aspect of a master mechanic. If it is not exact, the animal will adjust and readjust until it is."

"Thus he conscientiously earns his wages, which, paid in rest and meal cakes, conform to a given standard. When the cakes are offered by his keeper, the elephant swings them to and fro with his trunk, weighing them with the precision of a grocer. Should they fall short the fraction of an ounce in weight, the welkin is made to resound with wrathful trumpeting before which the unaccustomed foe, and which the keeper hastens to quell by further measures of provocation."

"The keepers are allowed half an hour for their midday meal, but the elephants, for their own election, require twice as much time for their noonday feed, and no urging will induce them to return to their labor inside of an hour. Also they strictly observe the Mosaic law in resting on

the seventh day, although they are not particular as to which seventh day is marked for rest. Six days in a week only will they labor."

"Of course, there are boss elephants but I do not know whether or not they formulate union rules. I think, however, they do, and that soon the elephants will be after Saturday half holidays."—New York Press.

CLOSING UP THE PETITIONS

Mr. Cowgill Comes Down from Baker for Finish

W. C. Cowgill, the Baker City newspaper man, who is pushing the referendum petitions, is in the city closing up the work he has undertaken. He has circulated petitions in all the counties of the state to refer the new-passed laws on the exemption amendment, the portage railroad appropriation and the corporation tax. He has received reports and petitions from most of the localities, and is convinced that he will have enough signatures for each to refer these bills to the vote of the people in 1904. The limit for filing these petitions will be on Thursday evening, May 21st, when Mr. Cowgill hopes to have everything in shape.

He reports that the work of circulating the petitions in the various counties has been well handled by the local representatives. The time for voting on these laws will be at the next regular election after this year, or in June, 1904. The work of counting up will be begun at once by Mr. Cowgill, Mr. Johnson and Miss Corbell, of this city, and when all is completed will be filed with the secretary of state.

In this connection it will be of interest to note that the necessary names to refer the Lewis and Clark appropriation have been secured to the petitions. Over 6000 were obtained in Portland alone by the labor unions, and now the matter is being held up with a view to obtaining certain concessions. If the demands of the unions are met the petitions will never be filed, and it is believed that the whole matter will be side-tracked as a result of these negotiations.
