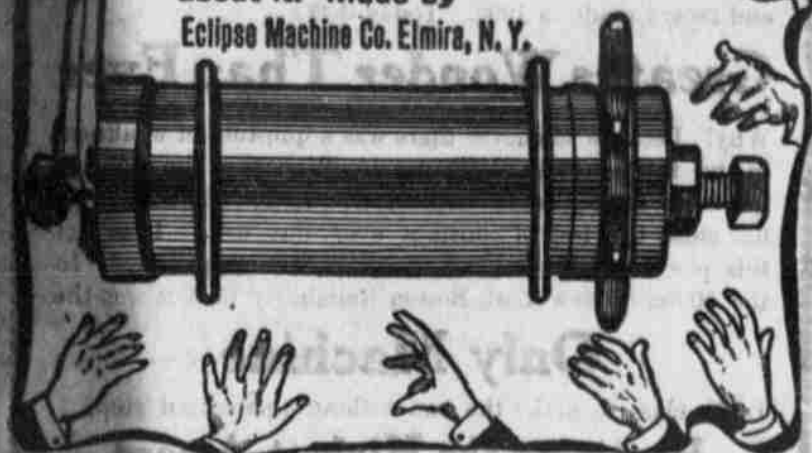

THE FIRST FLAG IN MANILA

Hung Over the Street in Front of Portland Hotel Thursday

Went up in the Old City of the Dons When the Spanish Flag Came Down Forever

President Roosevelt and every other patriotic American who today passes under the large American flag suspended high over Sixth street in front of the Portland hotel, will gaze on it with more than usual interest when they know it was the first American flag hoisted on the walls of the old city of Manila. It took the place of the Spanish flag, the lowering of which marked the end of Spanish rule in the Philippines.

The flag was sent ashore from the battleship Olympia by Admiral Dewey in charge of Lieutenant Brumbage, and two midshipmen, who reported to General Merritt, and after the terms of capitulation had been agreed upon the Spanish flag was lowered and this flag raised in its place with the same halliards. There were two battalions of the Second Regiment of Oregon Volunteers inside the walls at the time, and the band of that regiment on its way into the city came along just as the flag was raised and, halting, played "The Star-Spangled Banner," probably the first time this grand old air had ever been played in Manila. The enthusiasm, thus aroused, in connection with the raising of the flag, can be better imagined than described, and the heavens were rent with the cheers of the Americans in which many of the inhabitants joined.

General Summers was appointed provost marshal, and it was his duty to give orders for the raising and lowering of the big flag daily. It was found that the flag was too large for the staff which supported it, and was likely to break it. Then General McArthur arrived in the city to succeed General Summers as provost marshal, and that morning General Summers ordered the large flag replaced by a proper garrison flag, which the pole could sustain.

Having at heart the interests of the State of Oregon, whose troops were the first to land in the City of Manila, and feeling that the large flag would be a souvenir for this state which would be appreciated by future generations, General Summers took charge of it and shipped it home before the troop returned. No state in the union has a trophy of the Spanish-American War more sacred than this.

Such trophies are generally sent to Washington to be preserved, but, owing to the circumstances, Flag Lieutenant Brumbage could not secure it at the time, and so it fell to this state. As it had been sent from the Olympia, Admiral Dewey was desirous of having it returned, and he had a hunt for it kept up for two months, but it had started for Oregon and could not be found, and it is now the property of this state by right of conquest and possession.

The end of the flag has been mutilated by relic hunters. It was displayed here at the time of the return of the Oregon troops from Manila, and was hung so low that a number of persons, knowing its history, took the opportunity to cut off small pieces. Pains were taken on this occasion to have it hung out of the reach of all relic hunters. Eventually the flag will probably be placed in the state capitol, and as a relic it will increase in value as the years roll on.—Oregonian

Notes From Myrtle Creek

This is one of the beautiful and thrifty towns of the Umpqua valley, and at this season of the year there is not a more beautiful region out of doors.

Mrs. John Craig, of Salem, lives here a good share of the year, and enjoys good health. The mountain climate and water makes this an ideal spot.

The mayor of Myrtle Creek is Wm. P. Johnson, of the Johnson Lumber Company, who are operating a half-million dollar plant here. The product of their mill is flumed down, and a railroad to the mill, an electric light plant and telephone line are projects under headway. Mr. Johnson has done a great deal to put life into this old place on the Oregon trail, and, like some other public-spirited men, his work is not appreciated. He has one of the greatest and most profitable sawmill propositions in the state.

Six hundred people witnessed the ball game yesterday between the Salem league team and the Silverton team at the O. A. A. C. park, on Anyum avenue. The game was good practice for the Raglans, the score being 8 to 1 in favor of Salem. Lucas pitched the first five innings for the Raglans, and fanned out nine men. Sam Morris added six more during the last three innings. A Jordan pitched for the visitors, and did good work.

The Raglans go to Eugene tomorrow to play the second series of games with that team.

Were Handily Placed.

The amazing fact has come out that during the session of the Missouri legislature of 1901 the leading lobbyists, engaged in procuring legislation by duping of \$1000 bills, were given a place just back of the seat occupied by the presiding officer of the senate, Lieutenant-Governor Lee, with a screen concealing them from view. Here they were able to watch the proceedings, write amendments to measures as they came up—which they sent to their chief agent on the floor to be introduced—and communicate to the chair their desires as to rulings. They thus attended to "the delivery of the goods" they had paid for, and saw that no "mistakes" were made by the members. All this was testified to by several witnesses, including the now prominent ex-Lieutenant Governor Lee himself.
