REAMES INDIFFERENT TO APPROPRIATIONS.

In his speech at Salem Mr. Reames said we might as well pour public money into the briny deep as to improve our rivers and harbors and not tear down the tariff walls.

Hermann will get the appropriations without tearing down the tariff.

The Democratic candidate for congress plainly gave warning that he was indifferent to the development of our waterways and seaports unless he could have his way in destroying the protective tariff.

Hermann believes in public improvements and a protective tariff.

Well, as the congress is already elected, and is strongly Republican, how can he expect that congress to tear down the tariff barriers, according to the Democratic platform, before improving rivers and harbors?

Coming from a small, interior town in Southern Oregon, he has no vital interest in the development of our rivers and harbors. He has a college graduate's overweening conception of a free trade tariff theory.

Hermann is a champion of Oregon rivers and harbors against the world. Such a man will be of very little practical value for Western Oregon, where liberal improvements are all-important to our commercial interests. His indifference to material interests condemns him.

Binger Hermann is not indifferent to Oregon interests for any cause.

In the same breath he tells us that he stands with Tom Tongue on the tariff, and then he says appropriations might as well be thrown into the briny deep unless he can tear down the tariff walls.

Protection to Oregon industries cannot be secured by that kind of a policy. Appropriations for Western Oregon cannot be secured by that kind of a man in congress. Reames is making votes for Hermann right along.

THE GREATNESS OF SAM WHITE.

Sam White proposes to add to his reputation as Democratic state chairman by single-handed and alone conducting the Reames congressional campaign.

White is the machine, wheel and all. Reames is the figurehead.

White and Reames are making the only speeches in this campaign. Only speeches in this canvass. The Democratic leaders and orators are conspicuously silent and absent. It is a one-man campaign, and Samuel is positively IT.

White does the thinking. Reames is only his phonograph.

But they are not needed all over Western Oregon. Western Oregon has too much rainfall. If anything, and the rivers are not drying up.

Restricting Sale of Opium.

The opium bill presently under consideration by the Philippine commission is drafted to prohibit the sale of opium to the Filipino people, and to suppress and restrain the sale to all other persons. It is provided that no one except a full-blooded Chinaman may use opium in any way as a narcotic. The act is made necessary by the spread of the opium habit among the Filipinos. The sale of opium to the Chinamen who are in the islands is to be regulated as follows: The act contemplates selling the right to import, prepare for use and sell opium to full-blooded Chinamen, to the highest and best bidder. The consideration for the concession to be paid to the insular treasury in monthly installments. There shall be under the main concessioner not more than one retail merchant to every two thousand full-blooded Chinamen in any town, provided, however, that each town may have one merchant.—Hongkong Daily Press.
