A GREAT OREGON MINE

Case That has Tied up a Vast Property for Over two Years

An Event of far Reaching Importance to Crook County--Will Help all Eastern Oregon

The celebrated case of T. J. Brown and B. W. Maddox against the Oregon King mine, which has been in the federal court for two years, has finally been settled by agreement between the parties. This is, indeed, good news to Crook county, in which the mine is located, and, in a lesser degree, to the state at large. The mine is situated in the northeastern part of Crook county, in the Ashwood district. It is well equipped, having a fine hoist, good pumps and comfortable buildings. It has been opened up to a depth of 625 feet, and the ledge has steadily widened with depth, until it has proved a monster. The ore is a chalcopryite, carrying high values in gold, but is a smelting proposition. Few Oregon people realize that the state yields silver, yet the writer picked from the dump of the Oregon King ore that would run 67 per cent of that metal. There are hundreds of thousands of tons of ore in sight, all of which will have to be shipped out, or fuel shipped in. This alone will compel the immediate construction of the Columbia Southern railroad to Trout Creek from Shaniko, and the building of a branch to Ashwood, about 12 miles. The mine belongs to C. M. Cartwright and — Edwards, who also own the famous Baldwin Sheep & Land Company properties.

It would be impossible to estimate all this means to the whole country, or the life and vigor it will put into that section. Ashwood district is full of promising prospects, work on which has been neglected, pending the settlement of this suit. It is safe to say that no event occurring in the last 10 years can compare with the putting of this property again in operation, in the magnitude of its bearings on the interests of the state. It means the immediate construction of 50 miles of railroad, the putting up of a plant costing \$150,000, and the putting to work of 3000 miners and prospectors, the adding of 10,000 to the population of Crook, Wasco and Wheeler counties within two years, and the development of that much-neglected part of the state, Crook, and the counties south and east of it. It means more than all the immediate facing of all Southern and Southeastern Oregon with railroads.

THE HOP MARKET QUIET

Sellers Have Pooled and Hold for Higher Prices

The hop market is in a stagnant condition, owing to the inability of buyers and sellers to get together on a common basis. Growers are holding for 21c to 25c, but it is said some would let go at 20c if they could get offers. Dealers, on the other hand, do not appear willing to pay over 19c.

It is the general belief in the hop trade that the effect of the pool recently formed among planters will be that a large quantity of 1902 hops will be carried over until next season. It is said that Lillenthal, at New York, has as many hops as will go into the pool, and that he is making desperate efforts to unload. For this reason he is credited with having encouraged the formation of the pool, in order to hold prices up on the coast until he can dispose of his holdings at his own figure. Lillenthal was one of the persistent bulls in the early part of the campaign. For that reason he has not made friends among the growers, and they are in no hurry to take his hops. This is not the view taken by growers here, and they believe that hops are statistically strong and good property. Said a leading grower yesterday:

A few weeks ago J. Winstanley, McKinley Mitchell, H. L. Stephenson, J. R. Greenfield, W. W. Cotton and Otto Hansen, as board of managers, organized what is known as the Oregon and Washington hop pool. They realized that in no time in a number of years had there been a more favorable opportunity to pool the remaining hops in Oregon, Washington and California. No sooner had this movement begun than the market began to gain strength, the price advancing from 17 1/2c to 21c in a very short period. There are between 2000 and 4000 bales pooled in Oregon, and about that many in Washington, and the growers in California are pooling their hops in conjunction with the Oregon and Washington pool. Just how many are already pooled in California I am unable to say at this time. Within a very short time we will have complete returns from all the growers. Dealers are eager buyers for from 20c to 21c, but no one cares to sell at

Another Pioneer Dead.
Mrs. Martha C. Porter, a pioneer of 1848, died at Aumsville Sunday, aged 89 years and 10 months. She was the mother of H. C. Porter and Mrs. Mary J. VonBehren, and the step-mother of J. H. Porter and Mrs. E. N. Reed, all residing near Aumsville. She was a native of Cumberland county, Kentucky, and was married to Wm. Porter in 1849. She lived continuously on the old donation land claim until the death of her husband, which occurred March 30, 1899, since which time she has made her home with her son, H. C. Porter, within a half mile of her old home, but went to stay with her daughter, Mrs. VonBehren, for a few days, where she died. The funeral services were held Tuesday at 1:30 p. m. at Aumsville, in the old Christian church, of which denomination she had been a faithful member since 1854, conducted by Elder Roberts, and interment was had in the Aumsville cemetery.—Stayton Mail.
