THE STATE DEAF SCHOOL.

This Oregon institution for deaf will have to have its name changed, because the little children that are being educated are no longer properly to be called mutes.

Supt. and Mrs. Clark and their corps of assistants conclusively proved this to a large number of visitors at their closing exercises this week.

The parents of such children, and the taxpayers of the state, are to be congratulated that there is some progress being made in the education of these children.

Supt. and Mrs. Clark have been devoting themselves to this line of educational work all their lives, and are able to give the state faithful service.

Our state officials were fortunate in securing their services, and if they will take the bull by the horns, and move the school in from the country, they will have performed their whole duty in this matter.

It is seldom that educators can be brought from the East who so thoroughly adopt themselves to their work as seems to be the case with the present faculty of the School for the Deaf.

THE BUSINESS MEN'S SIDE.

A large petition will be presented to the city council against passing the proposed bicycle ordinance, that would shut riding off all the walks for the next six months.

It is claimed that the business men of the city who live out in the suburbs, and men and women and young people who work for a living in the city, will be injured by the law proposed.

Their interests certainly should not be jeopardized by any action taken, but these riders in the past have been the first to favor wholesome regulation of riding on walks.

The first movement in Salem for the protection of pedestrians was inaugurated by the business wheelmen themselves, and it is believed they will stand for the right in the present controversy.

All who use wheels cannot be classed as endangering the pedestrians, and The Journal has constantly tried to discriminate in its condemnation of the scorchers.

The business man's side should be fully presented, and the council will doubtless frame a bill that will protect the people in the use of the sidewalks, and the cyclists in the proper use of the streets and walks.

THE OREGON LAW SCHOOL.

The first graduating exercises of this new school for the education of lawyers will be held Friday night at the First Presbyterian church.

Salem has now two law schools, and is destined to become a great center for the prosecution of legal studies.

Here the laws are made and constantly being applied and interpreted by courts from the lowest to the highest in the state jurisdiction.

Great legal battles are fought out here in the supreme and nisi prius courts by the ablest lawyers in the state.

A young man studying law here imbibes the very spirit of the institutions themselves that produce the laws of the land.

The climate and the expenses of living are favorable to the acquisition of a professional education at the lowest possible expense.

All Salem educational and professional schools are building up rapidly, and the enrollment of the Oregon law school is no exception.

REMEMBER MEMORIAL DAY.

Saturday, May 20th is Memorial day, and is set apart by law and custom as a day for honoring the memory of the dead who fell in the great Civil war between the North and South from 1860 to 1865.

It is also fitting on that day to pay tribute to the valor of the yet living, and in the broader judgment and the greater charity of the succeeding generations this includes those who fought on both sides.

The Grand Army of the Republic is a national organization, and so is the Union Veterans' Union, both organized to perpetuate the history of the greatest struggle in modern history that a nation ever survived.

With these organizations the civic societies and the private citizens usually join hands in observance of the day. Business is suspended, the factories shut down, and there is a sad holiday with music and addresses.

Discipline at Columbia. (New York Times.)

Much discussion was provoked among Columbia students Tuesday by the very immediate prospect of a curtailment of the academic freedom of the undergraduates. President Butler's attitude was outlined in an article that he contributed to the Columbia Literary Monthly, as follows:

"What we need, it appears to me, in Columbia college and in every other college is a tightening of the lines.

They were much tighter 21 years ago and I like the sum total of conditions then better than I do now. Discipline too, has been relaxed, and the college student has largely lost the character building advantage of being in statu pupillari and of being compelled to do a good many things that he calls useless and does not like.

"Furthermore, he is much more in the public eye than is good for him. He rushes to the newspapers alike with his prizes and with his injured feelings. His boyish achievements are lauded like the labors of a Hercules or the valorous deeds of an Achilles. He is taught for a few brief years to look at life through a magnifying glass, and when the glass is taken away from him on the evening of commencement day things look small and tame, indeed.

"When Mr. Sadler was in this country last year he made the shrewd and clever observation that American educational government was a paldocracy, government by the taught. He was right, and he put his finger on a growing weakness in American education. When Chicago school children go on a strike against a teacher, it is time to call a special session of the legislature to restore corporal punishment and to make an appropriation for shingles."

The Columbia catalogue has this year for the first time made an allusion to matters of student discipline. It is a matter of general opinion that it is the intention of the university authorities to bring student affairs under university supervision in the future.
