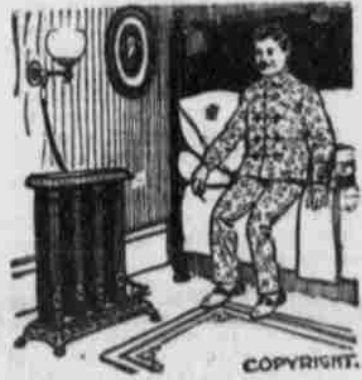

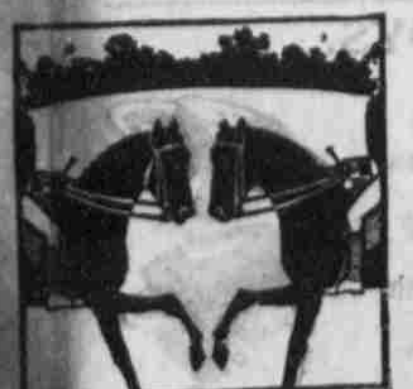

SALEM PROHI RALLY

Candidate Elmore of Browns-
ville Given a Hearing

The Prohibitionists of Salem held a successful rally at the W. C. T. U. hall Tuesday evening, and for two hours the liquor traffic received enough body-blows to knock it out forever.

Claud Fitch Phelps, of Hillsboro, saved the air and put all the white temperance sheep, with God as their leader, into the Prohi party, and the rest of mankind going to the devil under the personal leadership of the ministers, elders, deacons, Christian and other people, who go to church but don't vote his ticket. Mr. Phelps is a fiery orator, and entertains a crowd, but he is young, and will take broader views of humanity as he grows older.

Hon. Bill Elmore, of Brownsville, who has served several terms in the legislature as a Democrat, made a really strong and effective plea against license. He made one remark that showed he had taken his Democracy straight, when he said he knew all about the saloon business. He is now a banker, and has had the satisfaction of seeing his town shut out the legalized saloon, but, of course, there is a great deal of boot-legging done in the back alleys. He said Brownsville boys were in the habit of going to Albany for their drinks, and often came home with their satchels full of bottled goods. The meeting closed with a hearty benediction by Rev. Ritchey, and there is one minister in town whose vote he can count on getting.

Cougar was Fond of Dog

On the morning of May 18th, says the Eugene Register, a large, fierce and very bold cougar made its appearance at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Poulade, an aged couple residing near Vida, and proceeded to consume their dog. It seemed to either have a bitter score to settle against the canine race, or else was extremely fond of dog meat, for when a party of Vidalites went to the scene they found the remains of two other dogs the cougar had eaten.

The party hunted the beast that afternoon, without success, then set two traps for him. On the second night their efforts were crowned with success. Mr. Cougar was caught hard and fast in the trap, but had gotten away, trap and all. It was easy to trail him, however, by the dragging chain, and the pursuit produced great sport for the party, who, after following him for a mile, heard the rattling of the chain, and soon had the beast surrounded. The dogs brought him to bay, and he was killed by one of the party. He weighed about 150 pounds, and measured eight feet from tip to tip. He had evidently been in many a hard fight, for he was minus half an ear and had many scars on his forehead.

Everybody in that neighborhood is happy now, says J. B. Minney, one of the capturing party, for the cougar has been killing calves and chickens for the past two years.

Killed by Accident

Lying by the roadside, cold in death, just opposite his home, Sunday afternoon, John D. Foshee, a highly respected resident of the Palmer Ayres neighborhood, was found. By his side lay a 22-Winchester rifle, whose leaden missile had penetrated his heart.

Deceased had some hunting for varmints, which were a source of annoyance. He was returning to his home, and had mounted the fence across the road just opposite his place. The top board broke beneath his weight, and in trying to save himself from injury, he cast the gun from him. In falling the hammer struck a block of wood in such a manner as to discharge the weapon, the ball taking effect in his body.

Deceased's wife and adopted daughter were attending Sunday School at the time, and on their return about 4 p. m., the latter discovered the body. Neighbors in the vicinity heard a gunshot about 3 p. m., at which time it is believed the unfortunate man met his death.—Eugene Register.

Julia Ward Howe's Birthday.
Boston, Mass., May 27.—Hundreds of friends and admirers of Julia Ward Howe congratulated her today upon the attainment of her eighty-fourth birthday. Felicitous letters and messages were likewise received from many parts of the country.

Born three days after the birth of Queen Victoria, Mrs. Howe is today very active in the intellectual and social world of New England, and one of the most remarkable examples of mental and physical vigor extant. It is not unusual for her to deliver three or four addresses a week, and no woman in Boston can equal her as a toastmistress at a dinner or as an after-dinner speaker. She rarely fails to attend a meeting of the Boston author's club, of which she is president, and she still takes an active interest in the New England woman's club, the oldest and one of the largest woman's clubs in America. She is president of a number of other clubs, and it is not unusual for her to attend two or three meetings in a single day, while she is frequently seen at evening meetings.
