WHAT ABOUT MR. REAMES.

Shall a district, Republican by seven thousand majority, cast the first dishonor upon the present administration, when that administration of the Republican party is the cleanest and most highly respected we have had in a quarter of a century?

Because Mr. Reames is an educated gentleman, a clever lawyer and has a clever manager, shall Western Oregon place itself under a political ban and where it will be an isolated section in national affairs?

Got Close to the South Pole

San Francisco, May 28.—Lieutenant E. H. Shackleton, R. N., arrived here on the steamer Ventura from Australia on his way to England to make a report upon the progress of the Royal Geographical society. The ship Discovery sailed from England, November 16, 1902, in quest of scientific information and three of the party on board have succeeded in getting nearer to the South Pole than has ever been done before. These men are Captain R. F. Scott, in command of the expedition; Lieutenant Shackleton and Dr. Wilson.

They were ninety-four days on the ship with the temperature throughout at 50 degrees below zero, and reached a point 350 miles of where the ship was quartered. The latitude reached was 82.17 south and longitude 163. On board the Discovery were forty-eight people, all told. Two men lost their lives. One fell from the mast head and was killed and the other, Thomas Vince, rolled down a smooth glacier 500 feet and over a precipice eighty feet high to the sea. All the twenty-two dogs of the expedition died from the effects of poor food and the men had to draw the sledges themselves.

The most important discovery made so far is that of a chain of mountains from 7000 to 9000 feet high extending for 300 miles and it is believed to the South Pole. Lieutenant Shackleton is the only one of his party home. He, with eight others, was brought to New Zealand on the ship Morning, tender to the Discovery which recently took out supplies to where she still lies in winter quarters. The lieutenant will make a return trip to the party in a short time.

Steel Industry Not Hurt by Strikes.

New York, May 28.—Despite the great extent to which labor troubles have disturbed building operations all over the country, the makers of structural steel say there is no diminution in the volume of orders placed. The effect of the strikes has been discernible in certain localities, principally in New York City, but only in the suspension of small operations. The larger number of most material, those who use the most material, have continued to place their orders for the season, in the belief that labor troubles are only a temporary affliction. Steel men say that one reason why matters have not been so serious as reports would lead the public to suppose is the fact that employers have co-operated much more than ever before in helping one another out. The sales agents of several of the principal steel companies regard the uniform volume of orders as a very strong indication of the confidence of contractors and building firms in the early subsidence of the strike wave.

In steel circles it is freely predicted that the reduction in the price of pig iron will be a decided benefit to all branches of the industry. The same men who express this opinion have for months contended that the pig iron market had been forced to an artificial level, the maintenance of which would result injuriously to construction interests all over the country.

Three Brothers to be Hanged. Clarksville, Tenn., May 28.—The three negro brothers, John, Pete and Clay Johnson, will be hanged in the county jail tomorrow unless there is an unlooked for reprieve. The case of the condemned men has attracted considerable attention as it is the first time in the history of the state that three brothers have been sentenced to be hanged the same day.

Last October the three Johnson brothers attended a negro festival and started a fight. A negro named Redmond tried to quiet them and they chased him to his house, where they shot him dead.

Walcott-Smith Co. Portland, May 28.—Followers of pugilism in this section are looking forward to seeing an interesting contest when Joe Walcott and "Mysterious Billy" Smith come together before the Portland Athletic Club tonight for a twenty round bout. The fight was originally scheduled for several weeks ago, but postponed at the request of the club. Since that time both men have been keeping up their training and from all appearance they are in good shape for the encounter.

Indians at Cleveland. Cleveland, O., May 28.—The newly organized Indiana Society of Cleveland, which includes in its membership many of the most prominent business and professional men of the city has made elaborate arrangements for a banquet tonight. Governor Durbin and a number of other eminent citizens of the Hoosier state have accepted invitations to be present.

Good Times in West.

Chicago, May 28.—Continued heavy shipments of general merchandise remains the chief feature of the traffic situation in the West. There appears to be no abatement of this class of freight and all officials report the movement greater than at this time last year. With the exception of the grain movement, the healthiest conditions prevail all over the West. Country merchants are now finding it difficult to keep their shelves filled with dry goods, hardware and other articles which go into almost daily consumption at this time of year.

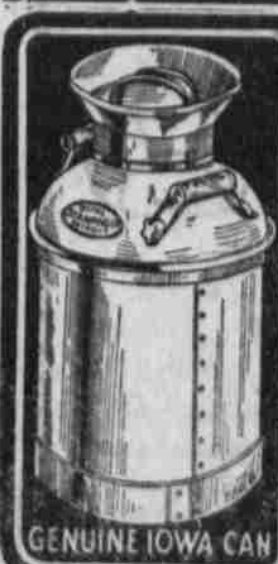
