

MEMORIAL SERVICES SATURDAY

Arrangements Completed for Its Proper Observance

Mexican, and Spanish War Veterans to Take Part, Business Houses will be Closed all Afternoon

Sedgwick Post, No. 10, G. A. R., met last night in their hall in the Turner building, and arranged all details in the program for the observance of Memorial day next Saturday.

Each year finds the "Old Guard" much reduced in members, and it is only a matter of time until a younger generation of soldiers will have to prepare the program and arrange the details, but, so long as the Grand Army of the Republic lives, it will have the honor of doing this work.

T. Holverson, has been appointed chief marshal of the day. His aides will be C. A. Murphy, representing the Spanish War Veterans and the state militia, and J. L. Stockton for the G. A. R. Other aides will be appointed later.

The old soldiers have invited the Spanish War Veterans and the Mexican War Veterans to participate in the ceremonies of the day, and these organizations are requested to meet with the Grand Army men at the Willamette Hotel at 1 o'clock sharp on the afternoon of May 30th.

The procession will form on Commercial street in front of the Willamette hotel promptly at 1 o'clock, and will march on Commercial street to State, east on State to Liberty, north on Liberty to Chemsaketa, west on Chemsaketa to Commercial, south on Commercial to the cemetery.

The parade will be led by the Salem Military band, followed in succession by Company F, Oregon National Guard, the members of the Grand Army of the Republic, old soldiers and sailors, the Spanish War Veterans, Woman's Relief Corps and other societies which may care to participate. They will be assigned positions by reporting to the chief marshal.

Owing to the fact that so many of the Grand Army men are getting too old to walk so far as the cemetery, arrangements have been made for the transportation by street car for the old soldiers from the Willamette Hotel to the cemetery and return.

At the cemetery the exercises will be according to the G. A. R. ritual, such as are observed every year, interspersed with music and the general orders from the national headquarters at Philadelphia, and the special orders from the state headquarters at Portland will be read.

The address of President Abraham Lincoln, at Gettysburg, November 19, 1863, is to be read during the exercises. This speech is famed as the most eloquent and finished product ever delivered to an audience upon such an occasion, and it will be gladly listened to.

All business houses in the city have decided to close their doors at 12 o'clock on that day, that all may unite in the exercises of the day. At their meeting last night the barbers' union decided that all barber shops should close at 12 o'clock, and remain closed until 7 o'clock that evening.

Program in the Evening.
Patriotic exercises are to be held in the armory at the city hall in the evening, commencing at 8 o'clock sharp, and the committee on arrangements requests members of the G. A. R. to meet at their headquarters at 7 o'clock p. m., and they will march in a body to the city hall to listen to the program, which will be as follows:

Typewriter for the Blind.

A ROUSING MEETING AT JUNCTION

Speeches by Til Ford, E. Hofer and L. T. Harris

A Big Crowd Gathers to Hear Them and the Greatest Enthusiasm Prevails

Junction, May 28.—Hons. Tilmon Ford and E. Hofer, of Salem, and Hon. Lawrence Harris, of Eugene, addressed a large Republican meeting here at 3 p. m. Saturday. There was great enthusiasm, and the program opened and closed with three cheers for Roosevelt and Hermann. A funny incident marked the speaking. Col. Hofer had, as usual, covered himself with glory in throwing a bouquet at the ladies, when Tilmon Ford stole a march on him by proposing three cheers for them, and got the laugh on him by saying: "Now, who's your ladies' man?" It was the largest political meeting held here this year, and produced a great deal of good feeling.

The Flume Finished

Corvallis, Or., May 28.—The Benton Lumber Company completed yesterday a flume for the transportation of lumber from its sawmill in the woods on Greasy creek to Philomath, on the line of the Corvallis & Eastern railroad. The length of the flume is 6 1/2 miles, and its capacity is 25,000 feet of lumber per hour.

The flume proper is V-shaped with sides of 24 inches and width across the top of about 35 inches. From the time the piece of lumber is placed in the flume at the mill about two hours is required for its delivery at the Philomath end of the route. It passes through the flume at the rate of about four miles per hour, and its work is highly satisfactory. The lumber cut of the mill is about 20,000 feet per day, and but an hour and a half is required in transporting it to Philomath.

The highest trestle along the route is about 30 feet, and the deepest cut about 19 feet. As soon as sawed the lumber is sent at once through the flume to Philomath, where the planing and finishing is done. The mill is located in the heart of a fine body of choice timber, of which the company owns about 50,000,000 feet.

A Crazy Locomotive.
Eugene, Or., May 28.—A man giving the name of Eugene Loper was taken in custody by the officers on account of exhibitions of insanity. He is an epileptic and fell in a fit, after which he almost completely derelict in a public place. He has been in the asylum for the insane in this state and in Washington. He will be examined tomorrow for recommitment.

Loper formerly lived at McMinnville, where he was known as "the human locomotive." This appellation was derived from the fact that he often ran great distances in a remarkable short time. One morning he left the Southern Pacific depot at McMinnville at 7 o'clock and struck out afoot on the railroad, arriving at Corvallis, 45 miles away, a few minutes before 12 o'clock noon, covering the distance in five hours, running all the way.

Another of Loper's specialties is sawing wood. It is said he can almost equal a steam saw.

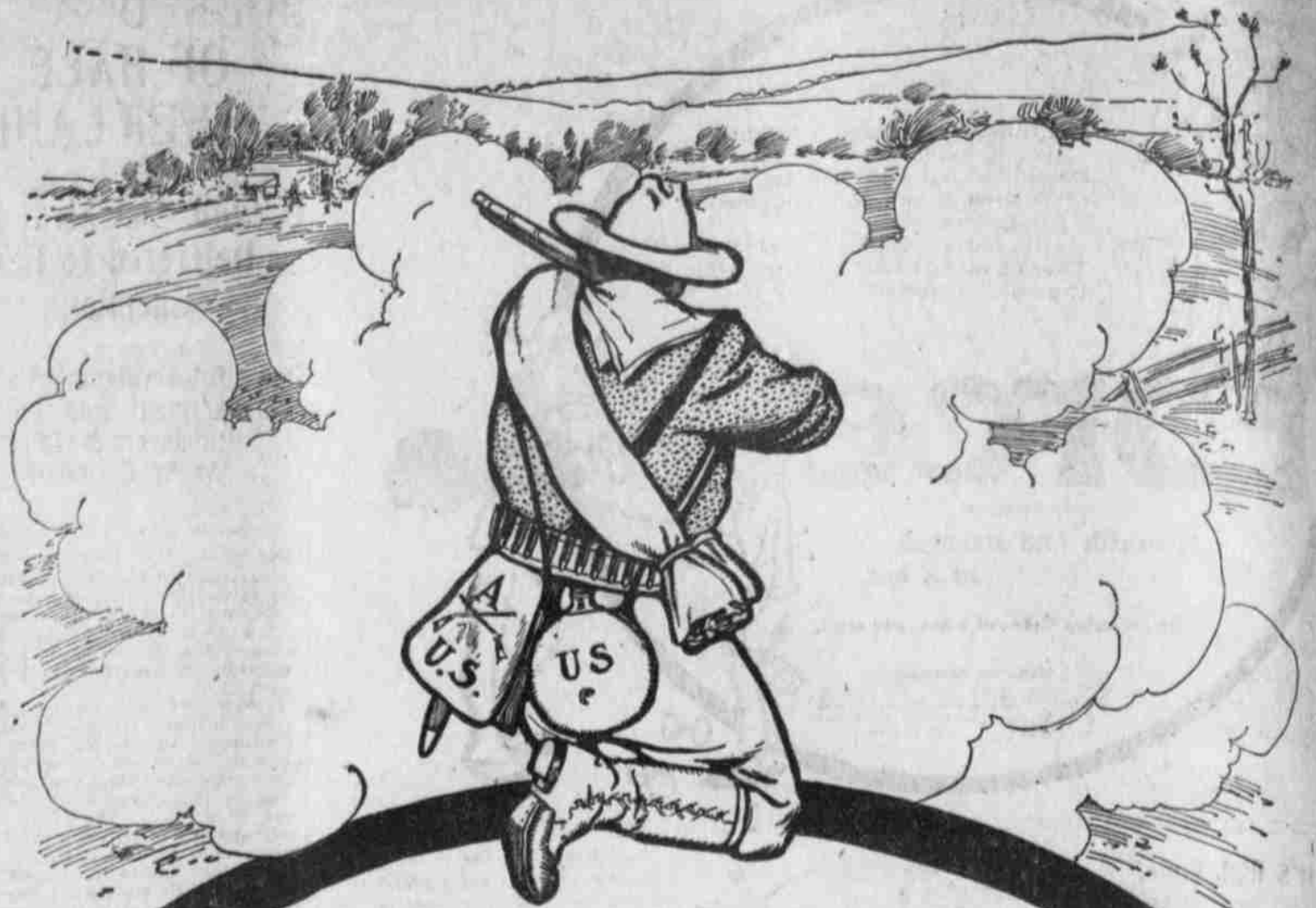
Portage Railway Board.
