INSTITUTE FOR THE BLIND

Holds Successful Annual Graduating Exercises

Large Attendance and Address by Governor Geo. E. Chamberlain

The annual graduating exercises at the Oregon Institution for the Blind were conducted at the chapel of that institution, in this city, Thursday evening before a large audience, who expressed their appreciation of the various features by hearty applause and the closest attention. The wall behind the stage was decorated by a screen of Scotch broom, in bloom, and festoons of fir were suspended from the ceilings to the chandeliers. Beautiful bouquets of Oregon roses were loaded upon the graduates, who were given diplomas as follows:

The officers and faculty of the school are as follows: Geo. W. Jones, supt.; Mrs. Jones, matron; assistants, Miss L. M. Church, Miss Colby and Miss Hubbard, teacher of vocal and instrumental music, Miss Colby, who has been teaching since January 1st, has tendered her resignation. The pupils today went to their homes in different parts of the state. Supt. Jones has gone to Portland to arrange for taking a special course in wood-working, to which he has given special attention, and many specimens of work done by the boys and girls were shown that would have been very creditable to those who have the use of their eyes. The physical exercises of the pupils were also very attractive and pleased the audience very much. Besides wood work, the students learn to bottom chairs with various materials, making hammocks, piano tuning and basket-making. The girls learn to do needlework and embroidery besides, and the industrial features of the school have been much advanced.

The musical work of the school has been promoted by the efficiency of Miss Bertha Hubbard, who is one of the best pianists in Oregon, and has had several years' experience teaching the point system.

Governor Chamberlain was present and delivered an address, speaking in the highest terms of the work done in this institution. He has frequently visited the school alone, and in company with the other members of the board, and knows all the children by name, and greeted many of them by name and with words of encouragement. His remarks were heartily applauded, and very much appreciated by the children and their parents.

Supt. Jones has made typewriting very prominent, and has introduced the Braille system of reading and typewriting, which makes the work almost as fast as that done by persons who can see.

The trio by three young men of the school was given an encore, as was the violin solo. The former responded with a sweet love song of old Virginia that was very much appreciated, especially by the governor, who spent his college days there, and must have recalled some of his old sweethearts.
