IMPROVED CAR LINE SERVICE

All Lines in Salem Have an Hour Later Street Car Run

Extensive Improvements Have Been Begun at Rebuilding the Tracks and Equipment

Beginning today the schedule of street car service will be extended so that there will be 20-minute cars on each line up to and including 11 o'clock.

The line from Hotel Willamette south has a car at 10 p. m. and then another car at 10:40 p. m. This line will have a regular 20-minute service until 11 p. m.

There will be a later car service, as follows: Leaving the cemetery, south, at 11:20; leaving the asylum at 11:40; cars for the city will leave the pen, the fair grounds and Yew Park at 11 p. m., after which these cars will go to the barn.

Lines Doing Better Business.

The street car service on Memorial day was on a five-minute schedule, and the lines handled nearly \$100 worth more traffic than in former years, mostly due to better service. The intention of Manager Springer is to rebuild the tracks, put the curves in the best possible shape, and bring up all the joints, so that the cars will run smoothly, and then, he says, he can make better time and handle more people. Signs are put on all cars when there are special occasions, like baseball games, circuses or camp meetings.

Rebuilding Tracks.

The narrow gauge lines are to be made standard gauge. New equipment will be placed under many of the cars, Mr. Springer going to Portland to make the purchases this week. A crew of 15 men started at the cemetery end of the line this morning rebuilding the track, and distributing ties on all the lines. The joints will all be raised three-fourths of an inch, and will come between two, giving a spring joint, instead of the jouncing that prevails now. The company expects to spend all it makes here for some time on tracks and cars.

Willamette University

There was an enthusiastic demonstration in chapel this morning. General Odell, chairman of the trustees, announced the joyful news of the payment of the debt to the students. The variety band was seated on the platform, and their lively music, alternating with the college yells and songs by the students, made things lively in the old chapel. The stolen clapper to the big bell was returned last night, and hung in the chapel with a placard attached, on which was inscribed: "Proclaim the payment of the debt throughout the land and to its inhabitants; ring out the old ring in the new Willamette." Dr. Coleman was unable to be present, but sent a request that all the students and friends be at chapel Thursday morning for a general jubilee.

The baseball game with the State Normal School, at Monmouth last Saturday, resulted in a decided victory for the "varsity" boys, by a score of 30 to 8.

The College Annual is out this afternoon. It is a book of 240 pages, bound in cardinal and old gold. The book is entitled "Wallulah," in honor of the daughter of the old Indian chief. A fine colored plate represents the Indian girl, and was posed for in costume by Miss Chapler, '03. There are over 100 illustrations in the book of classes, faculty organizations, buildings, athletic teams, etc. It contains a pretty song dedicated to the Willamette girl by Prof. L. S. Graham, of the College of Music. The annual is one of the best ever published in the Northwest.

Want a Little More Time

Chicago, June 1.—The restaurant and hotel men this morning asked for longer time to consider the demands of the 20,000 unionists. The decision will probably be made tonight. Two large laundries signed the scale this morning, and resumed work. One hundred and fifty are still idle.

Foreigners safe in China

Washington, June 1.—The state department today received a cablegram from Consul-General McWade, of Canton, says that all foreigners in the Yunnanfu are safe, thus allaying the fear that a party of American engineers, for whom the gunboat Callao was sent up West river, had been assassinated.

BLACKSTONE STUDENTS GRADUATE

First Class of the Oregon Law School Gets Diplomas

Fine Musical and Literary Program at the Presbyterian Church, on Occasion Friday Night

A fine audience at the First Presbyterian church Friday evening witnessed the graduating exercises of the first class to receive diplomas from the Oregon Law School, of which S. T. Richardson is the president and principal instructor. Rev. Ketchum opened the program with prayer.

The graduates were seated inside the choir rail, and looked becomingly modest, considering that it was probably the proudest moment of their lives. P. H. D'Arcy delivered a formal charge to the class in Latin and English, possessing far more fluency in the living than the dead language, as a matter of course, and, aside from the reporters present, no one caught the drift of his remarks in the language of Julius Caesar.

Dean Richardson, in a few appropriate remarks, then handed the boys their diplomas, and bid them Godspeed in the work of saving society from the depredations of and over-reachings of the mean and crafty elements of human nature.

Oscar Norton sang the "Holy City," and responded to an encore for which he was again applauded, although he was in poor voice from too much hollering as a baseball rooter for the Salem team. He showed that he has a fine voice, and is one of our most promising singers.

The formal address was delivered by E. Hofer, editor of The Journal, and he paid a high tribute to the profession in a variety of ways, and closed with an appeal for honesty and more resort to the higher or divine law that is the foundation of all law, and concludes with the realization that the law and the gospel are fulfilled in loving our neighbor as ourselves.

The musical features of the program were very attractive, and were heartily applauded. They were as follows:

The addresses were of a very interesting character. The graduates of the school are John R. Dimick, George W. Farman, David R. Parker and James E. Godfrey, to whom diplomas were presented, all are native sons of Oregon. Their standing in the law school is of a highly creditable nature. On Tuesday they passed an excellent examination before the supreme court of Oregon, and certificates to practice law were presented to them. The past year has been a very successful one for the Oregon Law School, and it is gratifying to know that the graduates of this year are so well equipped to practice their profession.

Dean Richardson is arranging for a summer law school at Newport during July and August.

TANKS CAUGHT FIRE

Big Oil Tanks at Kansas City are Now Burning

Danger of the Fire Sweeping Away the Tops of the Partially Submerged Building

Kansas City, June 1.—The Burlington's big oil tank, near the union depot, caught fire near noon. There is imminent danger of its communicating with the big building, which is partially in the submerged neighborhood. The Fourth-street viaduct was swept away this afternoon.

Flame to a Great Height.

Racine, Wis., June 1.—Fire this afternoon swept the southern manufacturing district of the city, doing about \$300,000 damage. The fire started in the boiler room of the Racine Boat Manufacturing Company, and before the firemen arrived a tank of gasoline, which was stored near by for use in the gasoline boats built by the company exploded.

A tower of flame 300 feet high shot up into the air, but, as it was Sunday, no one was about the factories, and no one was injured.

Oppose Opium Concessions.

Manila, June 1.—Opposition is developing to the plan for the sale of an exclusive opium concession by the government. The Evangelical Union is urging that opium be entirely excluded from the islands, claiming that its use is spreading and working great injury to the Filipinos. The Chinese and other residents oppose the creation of such a monopoly. The government will consider the matter June 15th.

Filipino Fanatic Must Die.

Manila, June 1.—Senor Rios, the fanatic Filipino leader in the Province of Tayabas, who was captured about a month ago, has been convicted of murder and sentenced to death. Twenty-seven of his followers were also sentenced to various terms of imprisonment.

A detachment of scouts has defeated and scattered the Olanigut Island insurgents, killing 15 of them.
