LIBERTY FREEDOM AND THINGS

Patrick Henry Writes Concerning the President's Visit

Can't Just Understand Where Baling Rope and Millila Gets Tangled Up With Freedom

Editor Journal: This is a great country, isn't it? I was aroused the other morning right after breakfast by a large sized commotion and upon inquiry found the President was to be here, with his staff. Naturally I turned out to see what the result would be. On my way down town I found a neighbor hanging out a large flag on his balcony, and out of curiosity asked him what it was. He replied it was an American flag, the emblem of the home of the brave and the free. I asked him if he saw any difference between the freedom of the brave and the bravery of the free. He abruptly left me to get his bicyclopedic and repair his knowledge box on this matter. Hastening on to the front I found soldiers, mounted men, women and children thronging the public (all streets do not belong to the public nowadays, you know) streets, waiting to see the President, the sovereign power of the home of the brave and the free.

The idea of the thought of freedom seemed uppermost in the minds of the people. Everywhere were streamers and banners denoting the popularity of freedom and good will towards all. Upon inquiry I learned the President was to be left off at the passenger depot, so I coasted out to that place. Here the emblems of freedom were on the warpath. He replied that he thought the baling rope stretched all around the railroad grounds was all right, but he didn't catch the idea of American freedom in seeing the infantry on duty. I says to him, "What's the difference between American freedom or European freedom, or any kind, for that matter?" You see he was rather foolish because Europe has the same kind. The only difference between the two is that in Europe they pay armies to keep freedom and they don't in this country. Seeing we were about to have an argument, I gave an untamed Mohair whorp and jumped into the masses and just then the engine whistled and the President stepped from the car. He was surrounded by a lot of men who wore the same make of a hat. I couldn't tell at first to which one of these hats the President belonged. I afterwards learned that these other half-hatted men were members of the President's party. One was his secretary. Another was Dr. Rixey. Another was a shorthand reporter. Another was a photographer, and so on. As soon as this party had connection with the platform, it was surrounded by a half-hatted service men, forming a body guard. This little maneuver strikingly reminded me of the stars and stripes flying at full mast over the surrounding territory. I had momentarily forgotten we were living in the land of the free and the home of the brave, my sentiments (it was very easy as I was standing very close to the express car, and a college graduate of the '89 class kindly enlightened me. However, in the presence of 20th Century knowledge we do not always know just where we are at! The shorthand reporter and the photographer reduced to writing and picture every word and move made by the President during

his trip. The detective escort made several of us feel that the President was imitating our European cousins, for this is the way they do it across the big pond. But we must have been mistaken, for we are not in the land of the free and the brave?
